## Judge considers nuclear fuel dispute

### State suing federal government about plutonium project

COLUMBIA — It's now up to a federal judge to decide if South Carolina's lawsuit against the federal government about an unfinished plutonium

processing project should be dismissed, or if the state's pursuit of millions of dollars in fees should move forward.

During a hearing in federal court in Columbia, attorney Randy Lowell said that the law is clear that the government owes South Carolina millions of dollars in fees and also must remove plutonium from the state because the processing plant wasn't operational on time.

"All of this is a problem of their own creation," Lowell, representing the

state, said during a 90-minute hearing.

South Carolina in February sued the U.S. Department of Energy about the mixed-oxide fuel project at the Savannah River Site, a sprawling former nuclear weapons plant along the South Carolina-Georgia border. The multi-billion-dollar project was intended to help the United States fulfill an agreement with Russia to dispose of at least 34 metric tons apiece of weapons-grade plutonium, an amount that's enough for about 17,000 nuclear warheads.

The plant is years behind schedule and billions over budget. Because the facility wasn't operational by a Jan. 1, 2016, deadline, the federal government was supposed to remove 1 metric ton of plutonium from South Carolina or pay fines of \$1 million a day — up to \$100 million yearly — until either the facility meets production goals or the plutonium is taken elsewhere for storage or disposal.

Lowell argued that the government

## Project to relocate Hamptons begins

Restaurant moving to old Burns Hardware building on Main Street

The project to relocate Hamptons restaurant to Main Street kicked off on Wednesday with the demolition of the facade at the old Burns Hardware Store at 35 N. Main St.

The project involves demolishing the facade of that building; demolishing the building at 4 E. Hampton Ave.; moving Hamptons to 33 N. Main St., the former location of Angel's Mexican Restaurant; and creating an outdoor venue in the space between Jin Jin Chinese Restaurant and Sumter Opera House.

Danielle Thompson, co-owner of Hamptons, said the move will ensure that Hamptons remains a downtown destination.

Being closer to Sumter Opera House and the upcoming Hyatt hotel will provide a larger customer base as well as add to the other downtown renovations, she said.

The building at 35 N. Main St. used to be Burns Hard-

ware, one of the oldest businesses on Main Street, constructed circa 1890. 4 E. Hampton Ave. was construct-

ed circa 1913 and originally housed a wagon repair shop.

Thompson said she wanted to save as much of the

buildings as possible, but the structures are not in good shape.

Her plan to incorporate a

portion of the original building at 35 N. Main St. into the

## Decorated WWII veteran remembered for smiling personality

U.S. Army retired Col. William Evans Reynolds Sr., 98, who landed on the beaches of Normandy several days after D-Day and supported the efforts in the Battle of the Bulge in World War II, died on Tuesday at his home in Sumter.

He was the husband of Doris Eddeleman Reynolds for more than 70 years.

Described as having a warm smile, loving generosity, strong faith and positive view of life, Reynolds served with the U.S. Third Army, as part of the 841st Ordnance Depot in Europe during some of the world's most trying times in 1944 and 1945.

Reynolds was recommended for the Bronze Star for meritorious achievement by his commanding officer, said his son, William Evans Reynolds Jr.

"He was a tremendous role model who was always smiling and upbeat," Reynolds Jr. said.

Kenneth R. Young Jr., his longtime friend and attorney, described him as "one of the fathers of the neighborhood."

Young was one of Reynolds' neighbors in the West Haven neighborhood of Sumter, which he described as a close-knit community.

"He was always smiling and always had the time to hear how your day was going," Young said.

Carl Andrews, an Amedisys Home Health and Hospice Care nurse who assisted Reynolds for the last few years, described him as a people person, who left a positive mark on anyone he met.

"He really had remarkable stories of his experience in the war," he said. "And he admired the ground that his wife walked on."

Andrews said Reynolds once showed him a picture of a Jeep in World War II on which he had painted his wife's name.

Born in Augusta, Georgia, Reynolds grew up in Florence and moved to Sumter in the late 1930s. He attended Clemson College (today Clemson University), and after a year of studies joined the Merchant Marines.

For one year, he worked and toured the world with the Merchant Marines.

He then enlisted in the Army and served as a second lieutenant in Gen. George Patton's Third Army.

He was sent to the European theater in 1944.

The 841st was dubbed the "Lucky Forward," and its job was to keep the Third Army supplied and equipped.

He was called back to active duty during the Korean War. Reynolds retired as a full colonel from the U.S. Army Reserves in 1977, after 36 years of service.

Reynolds worked for the U.S. Postal Service, retiring in 1977, and was a charter member of Aldersgate United Methodist Church.

Funeral services for Reynolds will be held at 1 p.m. Saturday at Aldersgate United Methodist Church.

**Sumter man charged  
after hammer attack**

Sumter County Sheriff's Office arrested a 34-year-old man on Wednesday for allegedly striking another man in the head with a hammer in September.

According to a sheriff's office news release, Donald Antonio Young, of 1128 Cherryvale Drive, hit the victim in the head with a hammer, causing a large laceration on his forehead, while at a residence in the 1000 block of Cherryvale Drive on Sept. 11, 2015.

The victim was transported to Palmetto Health Richland for treatment for his brain swelling and later identified Young during a South Carolina Law Enforcement Division lineup.

Young is charged with first-degree assault and battery and is being held at Sumter-Lee Regional Detention Center, awaiting a bond hearing.

**Calhoun County coroner  
charged with pointing gun**

COLUMBIA — State agents said they have arrested the Calhoun County coroner after he used his badge and gun to intimidate boaters racing on the Congaree River last year.

The State Law Enforcement Division said 61-year-old Donnie Porth isn't licensed to carry a concealed weapon and the county has no policy about the coroner carrying a gun.

Agents said Porth agreed to confront the racing boaters in June 2015 after they came close to children. He had on a swimsuit and attached his coroner's badge to a T-shirt.

Porth is charged with misconduct in office and presenting a firearm, which is a felony. He didn't return a message.

**Storms shouldn't douse holiday plans**

The Fourth of July extended weekend is just about upon us, and holiday revelers can probably go ahead and plan their picnics, barbecues and fireworks fun; but they may want to keep an umbrella or canopy handy.

Rain will be possible each day during the holiday weekend, but the thunder-

storms should not last long enough to wash away people's plans, according to Jeff Linton, a forecaster at National Weather Service in Columbia.

"There is going to be a chance (of rain) mainly in the afternoon and evenings," Linton said.

He said it would be difficult to predict exactly when and where showers might pop up.

"It's one of those periods when there

will be a 30- to 40-percent chance," he said.

While the storms aren't expected to move too quickly, they still should last only an hour or two, he said.

"I don't think there are going to be any total washouts," he said. "People just need to remember there is a possibility of storms."

Linton said highs should be in the middle 90s and lows in the middle 70s.

**Attorney says legislature flunked school funding test**

State lawmakers' efforts this year to improve public schools amounted to "tinkering around the edges without offering meaningful remedies," an attorney representing poor, rural school districts said.

Carl Epps, a Nelson Mullins attorney representing school districts that sued the state in 1993 for more support, was critiquing an update state lawmakers filed Wednesday with the S.C. Supreme Court.

The report, outlining the steps that lawmakers took this year to improve public schools, cited more than \$100 million in new state spending in the districts that sued the state. That spending, in the state budget that starts today, includes more money for teacher pay raises, technology and technical assistance and teacher recruitment efforts for rural districts.

State lawmakers agreed this year to spend more than \$300 million in added money on education for all school districts.

Gov. Nikki Haley, who backed the initiatives in her executive budget, also submitted an update to the court, outlining her push for more state spending on students living in poverty, technology and reading coaches, among other initiatives.

The Supreme Court ordered an update from S.C. leaders after ruling in 2014 that public schools did not provide children in poor, rural schools the quality of education guaranteed by the state Constitution. That ruling came in response to a 1993 lawsuit brought by more than 30 poor, rural districts against the state.

In their update, House Speaker Jay Lucas, R-Darlington, and Senate President Pro Tempore Hugh Leatherman, R-Florence, also outlined meetings of task forces in the House and Senate to examine the state of public education.

The House panel produced a report with dozens of recommendations that led to eight bills, four of which became law this year.

Two of the newly passed laws redefined what a S.C. high-school graduate should know and be able to do and

called for a survey aimed at identifying ways to entice new teachers to work in rural, low-income districts.

Two other new laws codify efforts already underway at the S.C. Department of Education under the leadership of Superintendent Molly Spearman. The laws require the department to provide technical assistance to struggling districts and to maintain an office that reviews and assists lower-performing districts.

But the bill that stood to make the biggest effect on poor schools did not pass.

First pitched by Haley in January, the proposal called for spending \$200 million in state money to help districts pay to renovate and rebuild aging school facilities. The House passed the bill, but it died in the Senate as the clock ran out on the legislative session.

Lucas and Leatherman did not promise to pass that bill next year.

But they did say the effort to improve public education is ongoing. "The Senate and the House are mindful of the mandate from the court and

are working diligently to improve the educational system for the benefit of all students."

The court ordered an update from state leaders after ruling in 2014 that the state's public schools did not provide children in poor, rural school districts the quality of education guaranteed by the state Constitution.

That ruling came in response to a 1993 lawsuit brought by more than 30 poor, rural districts against the state.

Epps said the update that legislative leaders filed with the court Wednesday "confirms what we already know."

"The Senate and the House held a number of committee meetings and received a lot of valuable information from highly qualified and talented people explicitly describing these children's plight and what needs to be done to offer them an education."

But, he added, the time for major reforms is overdue.

"A 7-year-old second-grader who was in one of the impacted schools is now 30," Epps said. "Another generation of children now takes their place."

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

### Myrtle Beach motorists will feel police sirens

MYRTLE BEACH — Motorists in Myrtle Beach will soon literally be able to feel the heat.

*The Sun News* of Myrtle Beach reported Police Chief Warren Gall said his department will soon be installing new sirens called "howlers." Gall said the new low-frequency sirens and normal sirens should keep motorists safer when police cars are rushing to a call.

He said the new sirens send a vibration that drivers can literally feel in the same way one can feel the vibration from a passing car playing a thumping bass line on a stereo.

Gall said the new sirens should make drivers more aware of what's happening around them. They are being paid for with a \$30,000 Justice Department grant.

### River near zoo had high bacteria levels

COLUMBIA — Riverbanks Zoo in Columbia said it's found high bacteria levels in the nearby Saluda River.

*The State* newspaper reported that bacteria levels high enough to make people sick were found in the river near the zoo.

Riverbanks uses water from the river only for irrigation of plants and ponds where four elephants and 40 flamingos live. There is no indication the animals have been sick.

Drinking water at the zoo comes from a municipal water supply. Most of the animals drink treated water.

Director Satch Krantz said the zoo began testing water in the river after reports that high bacteria levels were found in the Saluda Shoals Park several miles upstream from the zoo.

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# Turkish authorities identify suicide bombers

## 43 die in attack on airport in Istanbul

ISTANBUL (AP) — The three suicide bombers who attacked Istanbul airport were a Russian, an Uzbek and a Kyrgyz, a senior Turkish official said Thursday, hours after police carried out sweeping raids across the city looking for Islamic State suspects. Tuesday's gunfire and suicide bombing attack at Ataturk Airport killed 43 people and wounded more than 230 others.

The day opened with police conducting raids on 16 locations in Istanbul, rounding up 13 people suspected of having links to the Islamic State group, the most likely perpetrator of the attack at one of the world's busiest airports. The manhunt spanned three neighborhoods on the city's Asian and European sides.

The official, who spoke on condition of anonymity in line with government regulations, did not name the attackers.

"A medical team is working around the clock to conclude the identification process," the official told journalists, noting that extensive soft-tissue damage had complicated efforts to identify the attackers. The official could not confirm

Turkish media reports that the Russian national was from the restive Daghestan region.

From the start, Turkish authorities

have said all information suggests the attack was the work of IS, which this week boasted to have cells in Turkey, among other countries.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility by the militant group, which used Turkey as a crossing point to establish itself in neighboring Syria and Iraq. The group has repeatedly threatened Turkey in its propaganda publications.

Interior Minister Efkan Ala said 43 people were killed in the attack, including 19 foreign nationals. Of those who were wounded, 94 remained in the hospital, the Istanbul Governor's office reported.

Unconfirmed details of the attack continued to emerge on Turkish media.

The private Dogan news agency said the Russian attacker had entered the country one month ago and left his passport in a house the men had rented in the neighborhood of Fatih.

The Kars newspaper, quoting police sources, said the trio was part of a seven-person cell who entered Turkey on May 25. The assailants raised the suspicion of airport security on the day of the attack because they showed up in winter jackets on a summer day, several media reported.

The Dogan news agency broadcast footage of the Istanbul police raids. It showed a special forces police team entering a building carrying what appeared to be a steel shield to protect from possible counterattack during the raid.

## FDA questions hand sanitizer safety

WASHINGTON — Federal health officials want to know whether hand sanitizers used by millions of Americans work as well as manufacturers claim — and whether there are any health risks to their growing use.

The Food and Drug Administration is asking for new studies on how the antiseptic gels and rubs fight germs and get absorbed into the body, with a particular focus on children and pregnant women. The proposal unveiled Wednesday is part of an ongoing government effort to review decades-old chemicals that have never had a comprehensive federal review.

Agency officials stressed that the review "does not mean the FDA believes these products are ineffective or unsafe."

Hand sanitizers have become nearly ubiquitous during the last 20 years, offered in workplaces, schools, restaurants and other public spaces to reduce the spread of germs. Since 2009, about 90 percent of sanitizers sold to the public have included either ethanol or ethyl alcohol, according to agency officials.

Under current regulations, manufacturers can make broad claims about their products' effectiveness in killing germs. Bottles of Purell hand sanitizer, for example, say: "Kills 99.99 percent of illness-causing germs."

FDA regulators suggested they may tighten such claims after reviewing the information submitted by manufacturers.

"We're not trying to alarm people," said Dr. Janet Woodcock, director of the FDA's drug center. "Obviously ethanol and humans have co-existed for a long time, so there's a lot that's known about it."

But the agency has concerns about the possible long-term consequences of frequent use by children and women of child-bearing age, particularly those who are pregnant or breast feeding. The agency's proposal would require manufacturers to study whether three anti-germ ingredients — ethanol, alcohol and a type of chloride — show up in blood or urine after repeated, daily use. That could mean that the chemicals may be affecting the reproductive system or the production of hormones.

Regulators are also concerned about possible links between use of antiseptic chemicals and the emergence of so-called superbug bacteria, which are resistant to antibiotics.

"We need to get this additional information so if there are situations where caution is warranted, we can label that or inform the public," Woodcock said.

The American Cleaning Institute, a cleaning products trade organization, said it thinks the FDA already "has a

wealth of data on hand sanitizers in their possession to judge them as generally recognized as safe and effective." But the group said it would work to provide the information.

outdoor venue changed once it was discovered that the stone piece with Burns Hardware etched into it was not actually stone.

It was a synthetic material that could not be salvaged, she said.

She said photos were taken of the original signage so that it can be replicated and incorporated into the stage of the outdoor space.

Thompson said Hamptons will eventually move to the Main Street location, but current plans are to focus on renovating the outdoor space that will be called La Piazza.

She said the outdoor portion of the new location will feature a pizza oven, covered outdoor bar and seating area as well as a stage for live performances.

People will also be able to rent the outdoor venue for special events, she said.

The mutual wall between the outdoor venue and Jin Jin Chinese Restaurant will be a green sustainability wall, Thompson said. The wall will hold metal planters and various plants to give the space a true green space feel, she said.

Once Hamptons moves to Main Street, Thompson said the Hampton Avenue building will house a new casual restaurant that will also support the downtown atmosphere.

Thompson will present the plans for the outdoor space to Sumter Historic Preservation Design Review Committee this month for review.

She anticipates that the outdoor portion of the project will take six months to complete, and the entire project will take eight months to one year to complete.

## 15 drill instructors under investigation

## Probe prompted by falling death of recruit in March

COLUMBIA — The Marine Corps is looking into allegations of hazing, assault and physical abuse involving 15 drill instructors at Parris Island training depot in South Carolina, officials said Thursday.

The allegations stem from an investigation into the death of a Parris Island recruit in March, Maj. Gen. James W. Lukeman, the commander of Marine Corps training and education at Quantico, Virginia, said in a statement.

Raheel Siddiqui of Taylor, Michigan, 20, died after falling nearly 40 feet in a stairwell at the installation, the Naval Criminal Investigation Service has said.

Once the Marine Corps' investigations are complete, it will be up to Lukeman to determine "appropriate administration and judicial actions necessary" based on the study's findings, the statement said.

A spokesman for Lukeman, Capt. Joshua Pena, said there was no time limit for the investigations to be wrapped up, or for Lukeman to take any disciplinary steps, should he decide to do so.

The two-star general said all of the Marines under investigation have been assigned to duties that do not involve recruits.

"The safety of the recruits and the integrity of the Marine Corps recruit training program are among our top priorities, and once the investigations are complete, we will take necessary administrative and judicial action as warranted to ensure proper accountability," the general added.

Nabih H. Ayad of Detroit, an attorney for Siddiqui's relatives, said Thursday that the Marine Corps hasn't kept them updated about its inquiry and they don't believe they have the full story about his death.

"We have always suspected hazing of some sort," Attorney Nabih Ayad said

in a telephone interview.

Ayad said the Naval Investigative Service has told the family that their separate investigation could take up to a year to complete.

On Thursday, the Marine Corps general in charge of the education and training said in a statement the service is investigating allegations of hazing, assault and physical abuse involving 15 drill instructors at Parris Island.

Lukeman said all the Marines under investigation have been assigned to duties that do not involve recruits. That investigation is separate from the NCIS probe.

Lukeman's statement said the investigation reaches back to November 2015 and "appears isolated" to companies within the 3rd Recruit Training Battalion at the South Carolina depot. He said the allegations also involved a potential "failure of supervision."

The statement said that during the investigation of Siddiqui's death, it was found that a drill instructor was improperly placed in charge of recruits while being the subject of an ongoing investigation. The statement didn't de-

tail what that investigation was.

It also said that "existing orders, policies and procedures to prevent improper assignments were not followed," but did not detail them.

"Interim corrective actions have already been taken," the statement added, but it did not identify what those actions entailed or when they took place.

However, three senior Marines at the installation have already lost their positions in the wake of Siddiqui's death.

Col. Paul D. Cucinotta, the commander in charge of recruit training, was relieved of command on June 6. Sgt. Maj. Nicholas A. Deabreu, Cucinotta's senior enlisted adviser, was dismissed at the same time, the Marines announced earlier this month.

On March 31, Cucinotta relieved Lt. Col. Joshua Kissoon of his command. Kissoon had been in charge of Siddiqui's battalion.

At the time, the NCIS said its investigation into Siddiqui's death was ongoing and that no foul play was suspected. The NCIS spokesman handling queries did not return a call Thursday.

has given South Carolina repeated assurances that no plutonium would enter the state without a pathway out — like the production of mixed-oxide fuel, which would be sold to commercial power producers — thus keeping the state from being a permanent home for the materials.

But that hasn't happened, Lowell said. He asserted that the government is in breach of the law governing the project.

"The whole purpose of the statute is to ensure that we are not the dumping ground," he said.

Attorneys for the federal government argue that, while

the mixed-oxide facility isn't up and running, the Energy Department is already pursuing an alternate way to process the plutonium and send it out of state for permanent storage.

"The agency has spent years testing out different ways of dispositioning the plutonium at SRS," government attorney Spencer Amdur argued. "The agency is already doing it."

Given that alternate plan, Amdur argued that the lawsuit should be dismissed because the fees must legally be dealt with not in the U.S. District Court but in the U.S. Court of Federal Claims,

which according to its website "is authorized to hear primarily money claims founded upon the Constitution, federal statutes, executive regulations, or contracts."

"The Court of Claims is perfectly capable of awarding South Carolina the \$100 million that it wants," he said.

Attorney General Alan Wil-

son and several lawyers from his office attended Thursday's hearing. Also in the courtroom were half a dozen people who oppose the plutonium project and before the hearing held "Stop Plutonium" signs. One of them, Gary Dexter, said that the mixed-oxide fuel debate is similar to many other Energy Depart-

ment projects, which can often take decades to complete.

"What they want to do is kick it on down the road," said Dexter, 62, who for several years trained maintenance employees for work at the Savannah River Site. "Don't bring anything else into this state. Please."

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## NASA spacecraft nears Jupiter to study planet

Juno will map interior, take detailed photos

LOS ANGELES — Jupiter takes center stage with the arrival next week of a NASA spacecraft built to peek through its thick, swirling clouds and map the planet from the inside out.

The solar-powered Juno spacecraft is on the final leg of a five-year, 1.8 billion-mile voyage to the biggest planet in the solar system.

Juno promises to send back the best close-up views as it circles the planet for a year. Jupiter is a gas giant made up mostly of hydrogen and helium, unlike rocky Earth and its neighbor Mars. The fifth planet from the sun likely formed first, and it could hold clues to how the solar system developed.

### THE ARRIVAL

As Juno approaches Jupiter late Monday, it will fire its main rocket engine to slow down and slip into orbit around the planet. This carefully orchestrated move, all preprogrammed, is critical because Juno will zip past Jupiter if it fails to brake. The engine burn — lasting about a

half hour — is designed to put Juno on a path that loops over Jupiter's poles.

Because it takes 48 minutes for radio signals from Jupiter to reach Earth, mission controllers at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory won't be able to intervene if something goes awry. They'll watch for beeps from Juno that'll signal whether the engine burn is going as planned.

### THE MISSION

Spacecraft have visited Jupiter since the 1970s, but there are still plenty of questions left unanswered. How much water does the planet have? Is there a dense core? Why is its signature Great Red Spot — a hurricane-like storm that has been raging for centuries — shrinking?

During the mission, Juno will peer through Jupiter's dense clouds, flying within 3,100 miles, closer than any other spacecraft.

Earlier visitors included the Voyagers and Pioneers, Galileo, Ulysses, Cassini and most recently, New Horizons, which reached Pluto last year. Most were quick flybys en route to other destinations. Only Galileo — named for the Italian as-

tronomer who discovered Jupiter's large moons — orbited the massive planet and even released a probe.

### THE SPACECRAFT

Named after the cloud-piercing wife of the Roman god Jupiter, Juno carries nine instruments to map Jupiter's interior and study its turbulent atmosphere. Also stowed aboard

are three mini figures of Jupiter, Juno and Galileo designed by the Lego Group. The Italian Space Agency donated a plaque inscribed with Galileo's writings.

Previous trips to Jupiter have relied on nuclear power because of the distance from the sun. Juno is the first spacecraft to venture this far out on solar power. Juno, about the

size of an SUV, has three tractor-trailer-size solar wings that extend outward like blades from a windmill. The solar panels are designed to face the sun during most of the mission.

After its launch on Aug. 5, 2011, Juno took a roundabout journey to Jupiter, swinging around the inner solar system and using Earth as a gravity boost to the outer solar system.

### THE PICTURES

The Hubble Space Telescope and other spacecraft have returned stunning pictures of Jupiter, including a new photo released Thursday of its northern lights. But scientists said the best views are yet to come. Juno will get in closer and will provide the most detailed look at the planet's polar regions, clouds and auroras.

The camera onboard — the JunoCam — has been snapping pictures of Earth, Jupiter and its moons along the way. But the camera and other instruments were turned off this week to avoid any interference during the critical arrival.


P.S. Your uncle should be made aware that he can customize his account settings and make his profile private.







## Sovereign kingdom or little England?

**W**ASHINGTON — Given their arrogance, pomposity and habitual absurdities, it is hard not to feel a certain satisfaction with the comeuppance that Brexit has delivered to the unaccountable European Union bureaucrats in Brussels.

Nonetheless, we would do well to refrain from smug condescension. Unity is not easy. What began in 1951 as a six-

member European Coal and Steel Community was grounded in a larger conception of a united Europe born from the ashes of World War II. Seven decades into the postwar era, Britain wants out, and the EU is facing an existential crisis.

Yet where were we Americans seven decades into our great experiment in continental confederation, our “more perfect union” contracted under the Constitution of 1787? At Fort Sumter.

The failure of our federal idea gave us civil war and 600,000 dead. And we had the advantage of a common language, common heritage and common memory of heroic revolutionary struggle against a common (British) foe. Europe had none of this. The European project tries to forge the union of dozens of disparate peoples, ethnicities, languages and cultures, amid the searing memories of the two most destructive wars in history fought among and against each other.

The result is the EU, a great idea badly executed. The founding motive was obvious and noble: to reconcile the combatants of World War II, most especially France and Germany, and create conditions that would ensure there could be no repetition.

Onto that was appended the more utopian vision of a continental superstate that would once and for all transcend parochial nationalism.

That vision blew up with Brexit on June 23. But we mustn’t underestimate the significance, and improbability, of the project’s more narrow, but still singular, achievement — peace. It has given Europe the most extended period of internal tranquility since the Roman Empire. (In conjunction, of course, with NATO, which provided Europe with its American umbrella against external threat.)

Not only is there no armed conflict among European states. The very idea is inconceivable. (Fighting between the various nations has been subcontracted to soccer hooligans.) This on a continent where war had been the norm for a millennium.

Give the EU its due. Despite its comical faux-national paraphernalia of flag, anthem and useless parliament, it has championed and advanced a transnational idea that has helped curb the nationalist excesses that culminated in two world wars.

Advanced not quite enough, however. Certainly not enough to support its disdainful, often dismissive, treatment of residual nationalisms and their democratic expressions. Despite numerous objections by referendum and parliament, which it routinely either ignored or circumvented, the EU continued its relentless drive for more centralization, more regulation and thus more power for its unelected self.

Such high-handed overriding of popular sentiment could go on only so long. Until June 23, 2016, to be precise.

To be sure, popular sentiment was rather narrowly divided. The most prominent disparity in the British vote was generational. The young, having grown up in the new Europe, are more comfortable with its cosmopolitanism and have come to expect open borders, open commerce and open movement of people. They voted overwhelmingly — by 3 to 1 — to Remain. Leave was mainly the position of an older generation no longer willing to tolerate European assaults on British autonomy and sovereignty.

Understandably so. Here is Britain, inventor of the liberal idea and home to the mother of parliaments, being instructed by a bunch of pastry-eating Brussels bureaucrats on everything from the proper size of pomegranates to the human rights of terrorists.

Widely mentioned, and resented, was the immigration directive to admit other EU citizens near automatically. But what pushed the Leave side over the top was less policy than primacy. Who runs Britain? Amazingly, about half of the laws and regulations that govern British life today come not from Westminster but from Brussels.

Brexit was an assertion of national sovereignty and an attempt, in one fell swoop, to recover it.

There is much to admire in that impulse. But at what cost?

Among its casualties may be not just the European project (other exit referendums are already being proposed) but possibly the United Kingdom itself. The Scots are already talking about another vote for independence. And Northern Ireland, which voted to remain in the EU, might well seek to unite with the Republic.

Talk about a great idea executed badly. In seeking a newly sovereign United Kingdom, the Brits might well find themselves having produced a little England.

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

## Anti-Brexit elites aren't the ones who suffer from their policies

**F**ollowing the Brexit, Europe may witness even more plebiscites against the undemocratic European Union throughout the continent.

The furor of ignored Europeans against their union is not just directed against rich and powerful government elites per se or against the flood of mostly young male migrants from the war-torn Middle East. The rage also arises from the hypocrisy of a governing elite that never seems to be subject to the ramifications of its own top-down policies. The bureaucratic class that runs Europe from Brussels and Strasbourg too often lectures European voters on climate change, immigration, politically correct attitudes about diversity and the constant need for more bureaucracy, more regulations and more redistributive taxes.

But Euro-managers are able to navigate around their own injunctions, enjoying private schools for their children, generous public pay, retirement packages and perks; frequent carbon-spewing jet travel; homes in non-diverse neighborhoods; and profitable revolving-door careers between government and business.

The Western elite classes, both professedly liberal and conservative, square the circle of their privilege with politically correct sermonizing. They romanticize the distant “other” — usually immigrants and minorities — while condescendingly lecturing the middle and working classes, often the losers in globalization, about their lack of sensitivity.

On this side of the Atlantic, President Obama has developed a curious habit of talking down to Americans about their supposedly reactionary opposition to rampant immigration, affirmative action, multiculturalism, and political correctness — most notably in his caricatures of the purported “clingers” of Pennsylvania.

Yet Obama seems uncomfortable when confronted with the prospect of living out what he envisions for others. He prefers golfing with celebrities to bowling. He vacations in Martha’s Vineyard rather than returning home to his Chicago

go mansion. His travel entourage is royal and hardly green. And he insists on private prep schools for his children rather than enrolling them in the public schools of Washington, D.C., whose educators he so often shields from long-needed reform.

In similar fashion, grandees such as Facebook billionaire Mark Zuckerberg and Univision anchor Jorge Ramos do not live what they profess. They often lecture supposedly less-sophisticated Americans on their backward opposition to illegal immigration. But both live in communities segregated from those they champion in the abstract.

The Clintons often pontificate about “fairness” but somehow managed to amass a personal fortune of more than \$100 million by speaking to and lobbying banks, Wall Street profiteers and foreign entities.

The pay-to-play rich were willing to brush aside the insincere, pro forma social-justice talk of the Clintons and reward Hillary and Bill with obscene fees that would presumably result in lucrative government attention.

Consider the recent Orlando tragedy for more of the same paradoxes. The terrorist killer, Omar Mateen — a registered Democrat, proud radical Muslim and occasional patron of gay dating sites — murdered 49 people and wounded even more in a gay nightclub. His profile and motive certainly did not fit the elite narrative that unsophisticated right-wing American gun owners were responsible because of their support for gun rights.

No matter. The Obama administration and much of the media refused to at-

tribute the horror in Orlando to Mateen’s self-confessed radical Islamist agenda. Instead, they blamed the shooter’s semi-automatic .223-caliber rifle and a purported climate of hate toward gays.

Many Americans were bewildered by the logic. It’s reasonable to conclude that the shooter was conflicted about his religion’s strict prohibitions about his lifestyle — and especially the American brand of tolerance as exemplified by the nightclub. Mateen’s immigrant father from Afghanistan is a crude homophobe who had praised the murderous Taliban. Mateen somehow had cleared all background checks and on at least two occasions had been interviewed and dismissed by the FBI.

In sum, elites ignored the likely causes of the Orlando shooting: the appeal of ISIS-generated hatred to some young, second-generation radical Muslim men living in Western societies and the politically correct inability of Western authorities to short-circuit that clear-cut connection.

Instead, the establishment all but blamed Middle America for supposedly being anti-gay and pro-gun.

In both the U.S. and Britain, such politically correct hypocrisy is superimposed on highly regulated, highly taxed and highly governmentalized economies that are becoming ossified and stagnant.

The tax-paying middle classes, who lack the romance of the poor and the connections of the elite, have become convenient whipping boys of both in order to leverage more government social programs and to assuage the guilt of the elites who have no desire to live out their utopian theories in the flesh.

America’s version of the British antidote to elite hypocrisy is the buffoonish populist Donald Trump. Like the architects of Brexit, he arose not from what he was for, but what he said he was against.





OMAHA, Neb. — Coastal Carolina coach Gary Gilmore often said he just wanted his team to reach the College World Series.

Until this week, he never imagined the Chanticleers would do so much more: They're heading back to Conway, South Carolina, with the school's first national championship in any sport.

The Chanticleers defeated Arizona 4-3 in the deciding Game 3 of the College World Series finals on Thursday, capitalizing on two errors on the same play to score four unearned runs in the

The Sumter P-15's and Manning-Santee Post 68 will both be in the American Legion baseball state playoffs which begin next week while Dalzell-Shaw Post 175 will miss out.

However, regardless of what happens in the playoff series, Sumter has a spot secured in the state tournament, which will run from July 23-27 at Riley Park.

Lyons.



sixth inning of a game delayed a day by bad weather. It was worth the wait.

"Whenever I die, I'll know this group of guys here, they willed themselves to be the national champion," Gilmore said. "It was just meant to be, no doubt. If there is such a thing as a team of destiny, this group is it."

Coastal Carolina (55-18) became the first team since Minnesota in 1956 to win the title in its first CWS appearance. Arizona (49-24) was trying for its second national title since 2012 but came up just short in a season in which it was picked to finish ninth in the Pac-12.

"Amazing season, and they're a deserving champion," first-year coach Jay Johnson said of the Chanticleers. "We played as good

as we possibly could this year, and they're the best team we've played, in my opinion."

Andrew Beckwith (15-1), the national leader in wins, went 5 2/3 innings after pitching two complete games and picked up his third victory of the CWS. He was named the Most Outstanding Player.

"He's been coaching for 21 years, and he deserves every bit of it," Beckwith said of Gilmore. "We got him to Omaha and we got him a national championship. The senior class, the hard work in the fall, the dedication of the guys who don't play much. It doesn't go unnoticed. It was a full team effort for the whole College World Series, and we got it done."

Alex Cunningham earned his first save, striking out Ryan Haug with a full-count fastball to end the game after Arizona had pulled within one in the bottom of the

ninth. When Haug swung and missed, Cunningham turned to his dugout, beat his chest with his fist three times and saluted before flipping his glove away to start the celebration.

"The running joke is that in high school I lost the state championship three times in a row. I was not going to lose this one, I promise you that," Cunningham said.

The championship was the first in a team sport in the 33-year history of the Big South Conference. The Big South could savor the accomplishment for only about eight hours. The Chanticleers become members of the Sun Belt Conference on Friday.

"This program has been a lot better than people give it credit for," Gilmore said. "They thought we played in a small conference and couldn't get this done. This bunch wanted to prove everybody wrong."

alma mater more than 20 years ago – when the facilities and so many other factors made such a thought seem exceptionally far-fetched – is now a reality ... and then some.

Gilmore worked for 21 seasons striving and grinding with the hope of one day just taking the Chants to Omaha, and then they go and win the whole thing.

Simply put, it will go down as one of the greatest accomplishments and stories in college baseball history with no shortage of individual heroes as well.

"To achieve what these kids did is the most amazing thing I've ever seen," Gilmore said on the field afterward. "... I mean, I'm like numb, to be honest. To say Coastal Carolina, national champions. I mean, it's got a great ring to it, but did we really think that was going to happen when we started this thing back in February? I surely didn't. I thought we had a chance to be good, but I mean this is a sacred play to try to win. It's been unbelievable."

Junior right-hander Alex Cunningham struck out Ryan Haug on a full-count pitch to strand runners on

second and third in the bottom of the ninth and cap a dramatic final inning in which Arizona (49-24) had already scored one run and was threatening to steal the game.

"Not at 7-7 I didn't ... We always knew we had a good team, but ..." Chadwick said.

"You never expect it," Paez interjected.

"It's almost destiny to be able to do this," Chadwick added.

## No. 2 Muguruza out

18 seeded players lose as sun returns to Wimbledon

LONDON — After two days filled with rain, the sun actually made an appearance at Wimbledon on Thursday, allowing for plenty of play all around the grounds, a chance to finally conclude the first round — and several surprises, the biggest of which was French Open champion Garbine Muguruza's exit.

No. 2 Muguruza, who reached her first Grand Slam final at the All England Club a year ago and won her first Grand Slam title less than a month ago, was one of 18 seeded players who lost on Day 4, including 11 women.

Admittedly lethargic, and displaying none of the verve or confident shotmaking she's known for, Muguruza lasted less than an hour in the second round Thursday, beaten 6-3, 6-2 by Slovakia's Jana Cepelova, a qualifier ranked 124th.

"My energy was not really there," Muguruza said. "I was trying, but (it) didn't work at all."

That same sentiment might have been expressed by some of the other players who joined her on the way out, including No. 31 Kristina Mladenovic in a weather-delayed first-round match, and No. 7 Belinda Bencic, No. 14 Sam Stosur, No. 15 Karolina Pliskova, No. 16 Johanna Konta, No. 17 Elina Svitolina, No. 20 Sara Errani, No. 22 Jelena Jankovic, No. 30 Caroline Garcia and No. 32 Andrea Petkovic, all in second-round matches.

That group includes a Grand Slam champion (Stosur), major finalists (Errani, Jankovic), the first seeded British woman at Wimbledon since 1984 (Konta, eliminated by 2014 runner-up Eugenie Bouchard) and a top-10 player considered a possible future

star of the sport (Bencic, who retired because of a left wrist injury while trailing American qualifier Julia Boserup).

There was nearly another big name gone. But No. 3 Agnieszka Radwanska, the 2012 Wimbledon runner-up, saved three match points, then took advantage when her opponent, 18-year-old Ana Konjuh of Croatia, twisted her right ankle by accidentally stepping on a tennis ball during a point. That happened at 7-all in the third set and, although Konjuh continued to play, Radwanska was able to finish off a 6-2, 4-6, 9-7 victory.

The seven seeded men who lost, all in the second round, were No. 8 Dominic Thiem, No. 13 David Ferrer, No. 16 Gilles Simon, No. 23 Ivo Karlovic, No. 25 Viktor Troicki — who launched an epic tirade at the chair umpire because of a call two points from the end of his five-set defeat — No. 26 Benoit Paire and No. 30 Alexander Dolgopolov.

Muguruza was never able to get going, making 22 unforced errors and managing to produce only nine winners.

She said she felt tired and on the verge of an illness.

She also wished she had taken more time to rest after the grueling two weeks at Roland Garros that culminated with a victory over Serena Williams in the final.

Asked whether coming into Wimbledon as the owner of a major trophy made her feel a weight on her shoulders, Muguruza replied: "No, not pressure. I think, for sure, more expectations from other people."

Cepelova equaled her best showing at a major by reaching the third round, but this was not her first significant result. She beat Simona Halep in the first round at Wimbledon a year ago, also on No. 1 Court, and defeated Serena

Williams at the Family Circle Cup in Charleston in 2014.

"Yeah," Cepelova said, "I like to play on the big courts."
