

Suspect opened fire on Florence officers serving warrant, killing 1

FLORENCE — The Vietnam veteran and disbarred lawyer accused of shooting seven law enforcement officers, killing one, bragged online about his marksmanship and love for the “smell of gunpowder” in the years before the deadly standoff, records and social media posts unearthed Thursday showed.

Frederick Hopkins lost his law license in the 1980s for mishandling money and faced several minor criminal charges in recent years, including disorderly conduct in 2014. It was about the time of his disbarment that he got serious about amateur target shooting, according to the

records and posts.

More details also emerged about the two-hour standoff in which authorities said Hopkins' gunfire prevented officers from rescuing comrades

who lay bleeding on the ground. The slain officer, a 30-year veteran, was tearfully described as the “epitome of a community police officer” by his chief. Two wounded city offi-

cers were released from the hospital. A third officer was listed in serious but stable condition, the police chief said. He said he did not know the conditions of three wounded sheriff's deputies.

Hopkins is accused of opening fire Wednesday from his home in an affluent South Carolina neighborhood after deputies tried to carry out a search warrant. He also allegedly held children hostage inside, authorities said.

It was not clear exactly how the confrontation ended. Authorities would say only that the gunman released the children as he was taken into custody, authorities said.

Hopkins was hospitalized with a head injury

Bicyclist killed in collision with semi

The bicyclist killed in a collision with a tractor-trailer on Wednesday night has been identified as a Pennsylvania man by Sumter County officials.

Coroner Robbie Baker said Seth Vaughn, 39, of Eldred, Pennsylvania, was pronounced dead at the scene when he was struck by the 18-wheeler on U.S. 15 North about 11:45 p.m.

An autopsy will be performed in Newberry at a later date.

Vaughn was hit while he and the tractor-trailer were both traveling south on the highway near Dubose Siding Road, according to Lance Cpl. Sonny Collins with South Carolina Highway Patrol.

“No charges have been filed at this point,” he said.

The collision is still under investigation.

Clemson Extension works to get hay to livestock producers

CLEMSON — With widespread flooding in eastern South Carolina in the wake of Hurricane Florence, Clemson University Cooperative Extension is offering resources to help meet hay needs of the state's livestock producers, both in the short term and throughout the winter.

An online hay request form allows producers in immediate need of hay to enter their location and description of livestock for Clemson Extension to better assist them. The form is also available online at Extension's Livestock and Forages at <https://www.clemson.edu/extension/livestock/>.

"We're trying to make sure we have a place for people who have immediate needs for hay to fill out a short online form to let us know that they have that need, where they are located and how many animals they need to feed," said Matthew Burns, Extension beef specialist.

Significant amounts of hay in the Pee Dee region and parts of the Lowcountry have been sitting under water. Clemson Extension is working to be responsive to the needs of producers who have animals that may be trapped by flood waters and cannot reach other food sources.

"We're really looking for people who are in need and just need enough hay to get them through the next week," Burns said. "It's an emergency situation where they have nothing to feed their animals, and we're trying to make sure that they get that taken care of."

Clemson Extension is also compiling a 2018 Hurricane/Flood Relief Hay List that will provide contact information of anyone who has undamaged hay for donation or sale. Once compiled, the results of the list will be posted online at Extension's Livestock and Forages home page.

"For the next week, we're still working to meet emergency needs while these rivers are cresting and then, as everything goes down," Burns said, "there will be more people who need to replace hay that was stored for the entire winter, and will need to replace all of that."

Sumter man surrenders without incident in shooting of teenager

Attempted murder and possession of a weapon during a violent crime are the charges Byron Lyons is facing after he turned himself in to county authorities Thursday morning.

The 25-year-old was wanted for allegedly shooting a teen on River Birch Drive earlier this week.

Sumter County Sheriff's Office reported Lyons allegedly shot the vic-

tim, 18, on Monday evening.

Prior to the shooting, residents called deputies during a fight in the same area that ended before they arrived about 9 p.m.

After deputies left, the victim stopped by a residence when Lyons allegedly pulled up in a vehicle, got out and fired multiple shots before fleeing.

Witnesses told investigators Lyons

returned and fired more shots toward the victim as bystanders tended to the teen. No one was struck, states the release.

The victim was transported to Palmetto Health Tuomey to undergo surgery.

Lyons surrendered at Sumter-Lee Regional Detention Center without incident.

He is scheduled to have a first appearance hearing at 2 p.m. today at the detention center at 1250 Winkles Road in Sumter.

It takes a community Police, fire departments visit neighborhoods for National Night Out

In the spirit of strengthening relationships with law enforcement, residents hung out with Sumter's first responders for an evening of communication and fun during the annual celebration of National Night Out on Tuesday.

People all over the country join with their local law enforcement agencies to celebrate the event every year, Mayor Joe McElveen said Tuesday evening at Shiloh-Randolph Manor.

As mayor, McElveen said, he has the opportunity to talk with mayors in other cities about issues happening all over the country.

"I can tell you that our police department and our fire department are doing things to exceed best practices all over this country," he said. "We have something to be really proud of."

National Night Out provides an opportunity for first responders and residents to discuss issues in the community and crime prevention and reporting, said Sgt. James Sinkler with Sumter Police Department.

The job of law enforcement is to make sure residents feel safe in their homes and neighborhoods, he said.

"Our job is to make sure that the po-

lice department and our community that we serve get along and work together," he said. "Because the police can't be everywhere at one time."

Neighborhood watch groups are a big help to law enforcement, Sinkler said, because neighbors come together to prevent crime in their areas and keep the neighborhoods clean.

Watch groups can help eradicate crime in their areas by calling the non-emergency number, (803) 436-2700, and reporting suspicious activity, he said.

Sumter Fire Department also joined the community for an evening of bonding.

There has been one fire death so far this year, Division Chief Johnnie Rose said, but one death is too many. The fire department's goal is zero fire deaths, he said.

"It takes everybody here to make that happen," Rose said.

This time last year, there were five fire deaths, while 15 lives were saved in the city and county as of last month, he said. That tells us that the smoke alarm

program is working in the community, he said.

After the kickoff event at Shiloh-Randolph Manor, first responders visited different community events around the city and county.

"National Night Out gives us an opportunity to interact with the community in a relaxed setting," Sumter County Sheriff Anthony Dennis said.

The children enjoyed climbing into the MRAP (military surplus vehicle), sitting in our patrol cars and just simply interacting with law enforcement, he said.

This is just another opportunity for the sheriff's office to continue being proactive, he said, as it continues to bridge the gap between law enforcement and the community.

"I want the citizens to know that we will continue to form partnerships with the various community organizations," Dennis said. "Because, as I have stated before, violence can't thrive in neighborhoods where law enforcement and the public have a strong partnership."



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Girls on the Run helps students with self-esteem, health and setting goals

Girls in grades three through five have been participating in Girls on the Run at Willow Drive Elementary School. Shakenya Morris and her team of coaches are leading the girls in self-esteem-building activities, exercise and community-service projects. Currently, the girls are training to run their first 5K on Nov. 17 in Columbia.

According to its website, the Girls on the Run curriculum is designed to allow every girl to recognize her inner strength and inspires girls to define their lives on their own terms.

Throughout the season, the girls make new friends, build their confidence and celebrate all that makes them unique. The Girls on the Run lessons encourage positive emotional, social, mental and physical development.

Participants explore and

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Proposed tax break is designed to spur giving

More than half of Americans give money to charity.

But the number of donors has declined in recent years and could fall further because millions of U.S. taxpayers who make donations are now losing a built-in incentive for charitable giving. The tax code overhaul that went into effect in 2018 may cut the proportion of people who itemize their tax returns, thereby getting the ability to claim the charitable deduction, from about 1 in 3 to as few as 1 in 20, experts predict.

As a law professor who researches trusts and estates and charitable giving, I have long argued that more Americans should get tax incentives to give to charitable causes that matter to them. A new bill that would do just that has bipartisan support in the House of Representatives.

FLEXIBLE GIVING ACCOUNTS

Rep. Erik Paulsen, a Minnesota Republican, introduced the Everyday Philanthropist Act in August 2018, with the initial backing of three Democrats and two other Republicans. This legislation, if it becomes law, would create a new tax incentive.

Instead of allowing a deduction — reducing taxable income by the same amount as people who itemize give to charity — it would establish a new employee benefit: flexible giving accounts.

Here's how it would work. Americans whose employers provide this benefit would be able to set aside up to a maximum of \$5,000 from their paychecks. That money would flow into an account from which the employee could donate to charities like churches or other religious organizations, universities or food pantries.

Like the flexible spending accounts that Americans already use to reduce some of their child care and health care expenses, this money would come from pretax pay.

To understand this proposed system, consider how the preexisting ones operate.

Say a loan officer earning \$50,000 a year — who is single and subject to the new 22 percent tax bracket — puts \$2,000 into a medical flexible spending account. Based on my calculations, as long as she submits her paperwork on time, she can save \$142.90 in payroll taxes and \$440 in federal income taxes this way for a total of \$586.90.

The loan officer's employer would also save \$142.90 in Social Security and Medicare taxes, plus a small amount in unemployment insurance.

Roughly 44 percent of U.S. workers have access to at least one kind of flexible spending account, although data from 2015 show that only 22 percent of employees with access to a health care FSA used it, with dependent care accounts being even less popular.

FSAs might be more attractive if they weren't a use-it-or-lose-it proposition. Any money left over after a brief grace period at the end of the year reverts to employers by default. This arrangement forces employees to guess during their annual open enrollment periods how much they might spend in the next year on health and dependent care.

HOW THEY WOULD WORK AND WHO WOULD BENEFIT

There are two main differences between how flexible spending accounts work today and the flexible giving accounts in the proposed bill.

Employees with flexible giving accounts would direct specific amounts to be paid from those funds to charities when they see fit. Employees with flexible spending accounts, in contrast, usually get reimbursed for money they have already spent on their own.

The other notable difference is that flexible giving accounts would not have any use-it-or-lose-it problem. That's because employees would be able to simply name a charity to receive any balance remaining in their accounts by the end of the calendar year.

Flexible giving accounts would benefit employees and their employers by reducing their tax bills in exchange for charitable donations. I expect they would probably also help increase the amount of money Americans give to charities.

That would help stave off a decline in donations that charities and philanthropy experts anticipate due to several changes in the tax code.

Flexible giving accounts may therefore benefit a wide range of people, from the donors who will give to the charities that receive, and the causes the charities serve.

Poll: Young Americans say online bullying is serious problem

WETHERSFIELD, Conn. (AP) — Teens and young adults say cyberbullying is a serious problem for people their age, but most don't think they'll be the ones targeted for digital abuse.

That's according to a new poll from The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research and MTV, which also finds that about half of both young people and their parents view social media as having a mostly negative effect on the younger generation.

Fifteen-year-old Matty Nev Luby said she's learned to navigate Instagram and other social media apps by brushing aside the anonymous bullies.

"When I see a really mean comment about my appearance or something I did, if someone said that to me online, it means nothing to me, but if I pictured someone I know saying that, I would be really upset," Luby said.

Roughly three-quarters of 15- to 26-year-olds say that online bullying and abuse is a serious problem for their peers. Seven percent of young people say they have already been a victim of cyberbullying, with young women (11 percent) more likely to say they were bullied than young men (3 percent).

"People will make fun of their outfits or weight, their choices," said Luby, who lives in a suburb of Hartford, Connecticut, and has been dabbling in social media since age 12.

Her popularity on the lip-syncing app Musical.ly, which merged this

summer into the Chinese video-sharing app TikTok, helped win her some modeling contracts. Now she's mostly focused on Instagram, where she follows makeup artists and fashion trends.

Her mother, KellyLynn Mahoney, said she's impressed by her daughter's ability to keep bullies at bay.

"Her responses blow my mind," Mahoney said. "I'd be fists up at her age. She's like, 'I'm sorry you feel that way. You should probably think in a more positive way and then we'd have more peace on earth.'"

But she's also vigilant about monitoring her daughter's accounts, blocking any followers who seem creepy or fake and trying to steer her away from fixating on pages that degrade women.

"I have to constantly keep her grounded," Mahoney said. "I'm thankful she's aware that this is not real. It's our jobs as parents to reel them back in."

The poll shows majorities of both young people and their parents think parents have a responsibility to help prevent online harassment.

The long-documented problem with online bullying is that it is relentless. It doesn't let up when kids get home from school, safely in their homes, or even when they move away from their tormentors. Still, like Luby, many young people tend to be more resilient to trolling from strangers online.

"If they don't know who it is, it doesn't seem to bother them as much,"

said Justin Patchin, a criminal justice professor at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire and co-director of the Cyberbullying Research Center. "What concerns them is when it's some kid at school."

Patchin said that among adults, the people perpetuating harassment tend to be strangers, not people they know.

Leslie Hernandez, 39, said she thinks the impact of social media on people her age has been mostly positive.

"Adults tend to stay away from the drama that is part of adolescence," said Hernandez, who lives in Tucson, Arizona. "It allows you to connect with people from your past."

According to the poll, she is in the minority. Among parents of 15- to 26-year-olds, about a quarter, 23 percent, say social media has had a mostly positive effect on people their age, while 31 percent say it's been negative; 45 percent say it's neither positive nor negative. Among people aged 15 to 26, 47 percent say it's had a negative effect on their generation, and 26 percent say it's been a good thing, while another 26 percent think it's neither. About half of parents, 53 percent, agree social media has had a mostly negative effect on their child's generation.

No matter their age, the overwhelming majority say they see people using discriminatory language or posting such images. Seventy-eight percent of people aged 15 to 26 say they see such posts either sometimes or often, compared with 65 percent of their parents.

Only 4 percent of young people and 10 percent of their parents say they never see discriminatory language or images.

Companies like Facebook and Twitter have been trying for years to clamp down on abuse and harassment, with varying degrees of success. Both parents (72 percent) and young people (67 percent) think the companies play a major role in addressing these problems.

Roughly two-thirds of parents also attribute responsibility to schools (68 percent), law enforcement (66 percent) and other users who witness the behavior (61 percent).

Currently, young internet users report using YouTube (48 percent), Facebook (47 percent), Instagram (40 percent) and Snapchat (39 percent) several times a day or more. Fewer use Twitter, Reddit, WhatsApp, Tumblr or LinkedIn as regularly. Parents who use the internet are most likely to report using Facebook (53 percent) several times a day or more, with few being heavy users of other social media sites.

Hernandez said she's "pretty active" on Facebook, in part because of her job as a student housing manager at a college.

"Snapchat feels a little less personal to me," she said. "On Facebook you can kind of follow people and see what's going on in their lives in a more permanent kind of way. A Snapchat image, people will forget. On Instagram, people can enjoy the pictures but don't really see a whole (life)."

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French rescuers detect signs of life under quake-hit hotel

PALU, Indonesia (AP) — A French rescue team said Thursday it has detected a person thought to still be alive under the rubble of a hotel in Indonesia's central Sulawesi, nearly a week after it was hit by a powerful earthquake and tsunami.

Philip Besson, a member of the French organization Pompiers de l'urgence, said the team's high-tech sensors "detected the presence of a victim" in the wreckage of the four-star Mercure Hotel in Palu but wasn't able to say if the person is conscious. The device is able to pick up signs of life, including breathing and heart beats, he said.

He said the five-member team only had a hand drill that was not strong enough to reach the victim, who was trapped under thick concrete, and had to abandon digging as night fell. Besson said they would bring heavy equipment early today to try to rescue the person.

"We have to drill through the concrete to be able to verify and access the victim," he told The Associated Press.

Rescue efforts since last Friday's quake, which killed more than 1,400 people, have been greatly impeded by a shortage of heavy equipment.

National disaster agency spokesman Supoto Purwo Nugroho said the body of a South Korean man was among eight dead pulled Thursday from the wreckage of another hotel, the Roa Roa, which collapsed sideways in a heap of cement and steel. Local TV said the man, the only foreigner known to have perished in the disaster, was a paraglider taking part in an event in the area.

As the search for victims continued, aid workers raced to get shelter, food, medicine and other badly needed supplies to survivors.

The Indonesian military was bringing in hundreds more troops to help

with search and rescue efforts and keep order among survivors who have grown desperate six days after their lives were thrown into chaos. Hun-

dreds of the injured and other survivors lined up on the tarmac of Palu's badly damaged airport, hoping to escape aboard military aircraft.

Melania Trump visits school helped by U.S. in Malawi as part of Africa tour

LILONGWE, Malawi (AP) — Melania Trump got a different view of educating children as she visited an African primary school Thursday that has benefited from U.S. assistance but struggles with an enrollment of more than 8,500 students. Some children learn lessons outdoors, where they sit shoulder to shoulder on loose, red dirt.

Mrs. Trump toured several outdoor classrooms at Chipala Primary School in Lilongwe, the capital of Malawi, the second stop on her four-nation tour of the continent. The school is among those in the landlocked country that receive education assistance from the U.S. Agency for International Development, including textbooks.

Mrs. Trump was on hand as the U.S. ambassador handed over another 1.4 million books through a U.S.-funded national reading program. Malawi's schools have received some 9.6 million books under the program in the past several years.

"I wanted to be here to see the successful programs that (the) United States is providing the children and thank you for everything you've done," the U.S. first lady said at the book donation ceremony, held inside the school's library.

She reflected on the visit later at a meet-and-greet with embassy staff at the ambassador's residence.

"What an amazing experience. Meeting those children and understanding their different way of life is why I wanted to travel here," Mrs. Trump said. "I was heartened to spend time with the students and was honored to donate school supplies and soccer balls."

"My husband and I appreciate all that you're doing to serve our country," she added.

Back in Washington, Trump tweeted: "Our country's great First Lady, Melania, is doing really well in Africa. The people love her, and she loves them! It is a beautiful thing to see."

Probes of Trump taxes carry potential for millions in civil fines

NEW YORK (AP) — Though President Donald Trump insists he did nothing wrong on his taxes, experts say he could be on the hook for tens of millions of dollars in civil fines if state and federal authorities substantiate a *New York Times* report that found he and his family cheated the IRS for decades.

The statute of limitations for bringing criminal charges has long run out, but civil cases have no such limits, and the financial penalties could be staggering. Civil fraud charges for intentionally underpaying taxes, as the *Times* alleged the Trump family did, could include a penalty of up to 75 percent of the unpaid federal taxes and double the unpaid state amount, experts said.

The penalties "could be substantial, and if the allegations are proven in court, they should be levied," said Norman Eisen, chairman of Citizens for Responsibility and Ethics in Washington and former chief ethics counsel in the Obama administration.

The New York tax department said it is studying the *Times*' 15,000-word report and "vigorously pursuing all ap-

propriate avenues of investigation." New York City also said it would investigate. A spokesman for the Internal Revenue Service declined to comment.

Trump tweeted that the newspaper did "a very old, boring and often told hit piece on me."

The White House dismissed the report as a "misleading at-

tack against the Trump family by the failing *New York Times*," but spokeswoman Sarah Huckabee Sanders said the newspaper got one thing right: Trump's father not only did deals with his son, but also heaped praise on him by saying "everything he touched turned to gold."

A lawyer for Trump, Charles J. Harder, told the *Times* that there was no "fraud or tax evasion" and that parts of the report were "extremely inaccurate."

The *Times* said Trump received at least \$413 million from his father over the decades, much of that through dubious tax maneuvers, including outright fraud. The report contradicts Trump's portrayal of himself as a self-made billionaire who started with just a \$1 million loan from his father.

Tax law experts expressed skepticism that the IRS would mount any civil investigation.

and unable to speak with officers, Columbia TV station WIS reported Thursday.

The warrant involved an accusation that a 27-year-old person at the home sexually assaulted a foster child who lives there, Florence County Chief Deputy Glenn Kirby said.

Back in 2016, the 74-year-old Hopkins posted photos on Facebook of guns set up for target practice, bragging that he was the state's 2011 "3-Gun Silhouette Champion." In a 2014 post, he said he celebrated his 70th birthday at a range by repeatedly firing his M14 rifle, which he "set up exactly like the one I used in Vietnam."

"I have been shooting competitively since 1984 and lovin' it. I just

love the smell of gunpowder in the mornin'," the post said.

His competitive shooting would have begun around the time he lost his law license over \$18,000 in wrongfully collected attorney fees. A court order shows that the state Supreme Court in 1984 allowed Hopkins to pay back the debt over time and surrender his license rather than complete a six-month jail term.

Court documents also show that he was injured in Vietnam and received disability payments. The filing does not elaborate on the injury.

During the standoff, the sheriff's armored personnel carrier was brought in to recover the wounded.

"Fire was being shot all over. The way this suspect was positioned, his view of fire was several hundred yards. So he had an advan-

tage," Florence County Sheriff Kenney Boone told reporters.

Florence Police Chief Allen Heidler estimated Thursday that it took a half-hour to reach some of the wounded officers.

The slain officer, Terrence Carraway, 52, of Darlington, was just shy of 31 years of service with Florence Police Department.

Heidler described Carraway as the "epitome of a community police officer" and a guy who "laughed all the time."

Carraway "was a giant of a man, but he was the proverbial gentle giant, and I loved him," the police chief said.

Authorities did not identify any of the wounded officers.

The violence stunned the area, where many people have been dealing with the aftermath of Hurricane Florence.

Florence, a city of 37,000 in South Carolina's northeastern corner, sits at the convergence of Interstates 95 and 20 northwest of the state's well-known "Grand Strand" of beaches.

Byron Black, who lives near the subdivision where the shooting happened, said he knew both the slain officer and the children of the suspect and described the Hopkins family as "good people."

"You never know how stuff will happen," he said.

He said Carraway, his youth football coach in the late 1990s, was a down-to-earth community leader with whom young people felt comfortable discussing their problems.

"If you got in trouble, he would try his best to get you out of it or tell you the steps you need to take to get out of it," he said, later adding: "He was one of the good cops."

Her passion is helping students earn college scholarships, and her slogan is "Full rides are possible," she said.

Her oldest daughter, Chanelle Baker, a 2011 graduate of Sumter High, was "a true test it can be done," she said.

Baker finished ranked No. 28 in her class but earned 63 scholarships — 57 that she could use — in a full ride to Francis Marion University in Florence.

That was more scholarships earned than the class valedictorian that year, Mihlbauer said.

In 2014, Mihlbauer started PACE, which stands for Professional Assistance for College-Prep Excellence, and offers workshops, "boot camps," fairs and other events to help students and their families be successful in earning college scholarships.

The biggest misconception out there among students and their parents is that

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scholarship money is based on family income.

Mihlbauer said college scholarships are ripe for well-rounded students who volunteer in their communities and are involved in multiple clubs and organizations in and out of school. On those scholarship applications, officials are looking for leadership growth in students — like moving from a club member to a club treasurer, according to Mihlbauer.

She said it's also important these days for students and parents to change their mindset and not wait to apply for college scholarships until their junior and senior year in high school. In her work, she tries to motivate middle schoolers and incoming high school freshmen to apply for available

college scholarships.

The proof her business is working is in the numbers: To date, 196 students have received full rides through her PACE program, she said. More than 1,000 students have earned partial scholarships.

In her business, all proceeds for scholarship book sales and "boot camps" goes back into administering scholarship fairs and other free events.

She had her first scholarship fair in February at Sumter High.

The purpose of the fairs is to allow parents and students the opportunity to meet with various organizations face to face to discover what it takes to earn particu-

lar scholarships, Mihlbauer said.

She already has three fairs scheduled for this school year: one at Woodland High in Dorchester County, another at Sumter High on Feb. 2 and a third at Greenville's TD Convention Center.

She said a growing number of scholarships now are available to two-year colleges,

though, traditionally, opportunities have been weighted toward four-year schools.

Parental involvement is critical in her work, she said, and Mihlbauer requires a parent or adult attend many of her programs with youth.

Many scholarship applications now don't ask for grade-point average (GPA) or


class rank, either, which she said is another misconception out there. With PACE, Mihlbauer said she targets all students but especially those middle, college-preparatory level students.

PACE has taken off in popularity since she developed a social media presence on Facebook and Instagram in 2016, she said.

"Full rides are possible, but I don't sugar-coat it," Mihlbauer said. "It's not easy." She said parents understand the importance of college scholarships, though students often don't — at least not right away.

Drawing from her own personal experience with her oldest child, Mihlbauer said, at times her daughter would be mad with her about all the applications.

"But, in the end, she appreciates it now," she said, "because she's debt free."

While the film's working title is "a definite play on (Ernest Hemingway's) 'The Old Man and the Sea,'" the story itself is unrelated, McElveen said, adding that it is set in current times.

"The film will be a family friendly drama and centers on Nick Wolfe, who is searching for his estranged father," Lerchen said. "During his journey, he meets Billy Forde, an old man in the woods who has his fair share of secrets. The unlikely duo strike up a

friendship, which may change each other for the better."

He said, "The majority of principal photography takes place in Sumter and is being shot with an Arri Alexa Mini" motion picture camera.

"The community has been great to us," Lerchen said. "They've gone out of their way to help us."

Once the filming is complete, he said, "The movie will go through a rigorous post-production schedule, which generally takes about a year."

When it is completed, McElveen plans to show "The Old Man and the Pond" to local residents at Sumter Opera House.

Hulu launches movie-a-month horror anthology

Hulu launches the horror anthology series "Into the Dark." Every month for a full year, the service will stream a new movie-length episode, beginning today with the Halloween-themed "The Body."

Seamlessly blending horror and comedy, gore and farce, "The Body" stars Tom Bateman ("Da Vinci's Demons") as Wilkes, a suave hit man. If you can imagine the glib urbanity of Christian Bale in "American Psycho" combined with the tenacious and laconic single-mindedness of Arnold Schwarzenegger's "The Terminator," it's Wilkes.

When first seen, he's just murdered a very famous person at the behest of a shadowy client who wants the body delivered in four hours in order to make some grand media statement. So, from the start, "The Body" is propelled by a ticking clock.

Conveniently, for Wilkes, it's Halloween. So rather than clean up and hide his prey, he wraps it up like a mummy and drags it around like an elaborate prop for a holiday party. This ruse gets him entangled with some rich airheads on their way to an outrageous A-list velvet-rope rager. Complications ensue.

A fun premise and a strong first act bog down as midnight nears. By the end you're not sure if there's anyone left to root for as dead bodies continue to fall.

"The Body" will probably never be considered a classic, but Wilkes' mantra, "There is no we," is a memorable catchphrase.

"The Man in the High Castle" begins streaming its third season on Amazon Prime. This alternative history about an Axis-occupied America circa 1962 has been eclipsed in the dystopian-metaphor department by Hulu's "The Handmaid's Tale." A beautifully produced series, it also presents a lot to follow and digest. In addition to stories in three different American sectors (German, Japanese and the neutral zone), it offers filmstrip glimpses at alternative futures and realities that characters seem bound to either realize or prevent.

Its slightly baffling nature is compounded by the fact that the chilly Nazi SS-Obergrup-

'Flight of the Conchords' offers silly, ridiculous humor

We need more silly humor in our lives. And few performers put the accent on the ridiculous better than New Zealand comedy duo Bret McKenzie and Jemaine Clement, who return for the concert special "Flight of the Conchords: Live in London" (10 p.m. Saturday, HBO, TV-MA), their first appearance on the network since their brilliant eponymous HBO comedy left the air in 2009.

Masters of musical mimicry, they embark on absurd ballads, evoking Cat Stevens or Harry Chapin in a father-son song that quickly derails into a confessional train wreck of pathetic self-delusion. Other numbers, old and new, evoke the disco pop of the Bee Gees and contemporary hip-hop.

Their musical efforts are punctuated by seemingly sedated deadpan chatter filled with many references to the obscurity and insignificance of New Zealand. "Live" may make viewers pine for the old "Conchords" show, where a thinly constructed sitcom plot provided excuses for their silly songs. Nominated for 10 Emmys, the series introduced many to Kristen Schaal ("Last Man on Earth"), who later became known as the voice of Louise Belcher on "Bob's Burgers."

The highly conceptual lyrics of "Flight of the Conchords" stand in contrast to the thin gruel of humor emanating from "Saturday Night Live" (11:30 p.m., NBC, TV-14).

Now in its 44th season, it relies entirely too much on importing celebrities to offer belabored impersonations of the president, his appointees or figures from his administration.

Last week, "SNL" got a lot of attention by inviting Matt Damon to "do" Judge Brett Kavanaugh. But do these improvisational riffs rise to the level of satire? Or are they merely part of a highly partisan echo chamber, reacting to a president who already dominates too much of the conversation? And at the end of the day, is "SNL" a comedy show or a celebrity showcase? You get the sense that of all of these Trump-centric cameos eclipse the efforts of the ensemble.

One could admire Damon and "SNL" for attempting a Kavanaugh sketch only two days

after his testimony. But a far more original riff on current events arrived on social media well before Damon's appearance. Josh and Benny Safdie, the directors behind the film "Good Time," created a mash-up of Kavanaugh's testimony and Samuel Jackson's "hamburger scene" from the 1994 classic "Pulp Fiction." The collision of these two seemingly disparate items is much more inventive (not to mention funnier) than mere celebrity impersonation and imitation — and a clear sign that "SNL" needs to step up its game.

Awkwafina hosts "SNL" this week, featuring musical guest Travis Scott.

The proliferation of viewer choices has made it all but impossible for broadcasters to achieve a monster hit that appeals to a massive audience. As a result, cult series with large and passionate followings have become more desirable. Two such shows return on Sunday. "The Walking Dead" (9 p.m., AMC, TV-MA), now entering its ninth zombie-shuffling season, may be too violent for some, but it's still among the most-watched and anticipated series going.

A touchstone of British popular culture for five decades with an enthusiastic audience in 38 countries, including the United States, "Doctor Who" (8 p.m., BBC America, TV-PG) welcomes its first female time-traveling Doctor. Jodie Whittaker ("Broadchurch," "Black Mirror") is the latest to climb out of the TARDIS.

Before the prime-time airing of "Who," it will be simulcast around the globe to coincide with its British television premiere. BBC America joins the event (1:45 p.m.) on Sunday afternoon.

ABC has doubled, even tripled, down on precocious kids. The Friday night series "Child Support" depends on juvenile "experts" who help adults win prizes on a game show. The freshman comedy "Single Parents" features hapless adults who have managed to raise highly articulate little darlings.

Sunday, ABC launches "Dancing With the Stars: Junior" (8 p.m., TV-PG) for those who like watching semi-famous kids younger than 12 donning formal wear and learning to cha-cha. Former child stars

and "Dancing" contestants Jordan Fisher and Frankie Muniz are your hosts.

Sen. Jiminy Cricket showed up at hearing

WASHINGTON — Republican Sen. Jeff Flake may have become a momentary hero for Democrats hoping to block Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh, but Sen. Lindsey Graham has cinched the role as Jiminy Cricket of the U.S. Senate.

Never one to shy away from cameras or fall short on quotable one-liners, Graham came out swinging during Senate Judiciary Committee hearings last Thursday and Friday. Fearing no consequence, apparently, he railed against his Democratic colleagues with righteous outrage and said what was obviously true.

Somebody had to do it. Flake, who seems committed to living up to his name, bucked his fellow Republicans at the last minute Friday. After voting to advance Kavanaugh to the full Senate, Flake requested a one-week

delay to give the FBI time to conduct its own investigation of allegations that Kavanaugh sexually assaulted Christine Blasey Ford when the two were at a party more than 30 years ago. Earlier in the day, Flake had said he would vote for Kavanaugh, but that was before he was confronted (and, apparently, intimidated) by women on an elevator who said they were assault victims and that he was “telling all women that they don’t matter.”

But back to Graham, who is far more entertaining even — or especially — when he’s mad. The usually congenial senator showed up at Thursday’s hearing with Moral Outrage on his arm and Truth as his chaperone.

Love him or not — and who doesn’t love Jiminy Cricket? — Graham said in a very loud non-whisper what every sensible, fair-minded person was surely thinking: The hearings that ultimately brought both Kavanaugh and Ford to tears were driven by a partisan quest for power without regard for the human collateral damage.

Railing at the Democratic side of the hearing room, Gra-

ham nearly shouted, “Boy, y’all want power. God I hope you never get it.”

The only thing worse than Republicans with absolute power is Democrats with absolute power, right? It is true, however, that the pitiable spectacle of first Ford and then Kavanaugh showed that Senate Democrats were willing to martyr their own best witness against Kavanaugh to delay confirmation and, assuming they win the Senate in the midterm elections, block Donald Trump from appointing any more conservatives to the high court.

Graham’s passionate commentary was, thus, a rallying cry to Republican voters, whose intensity has been flickering next to highly motivated Democrats, especially women. By Friday, he was calmer and more relaxed, perhaps because he believed Flake was on board. He spelled out the reasons Ford’s story wasn’t compelling enough to keep Kavanaugh off the bench — no supporting evidence or testimony, not even a time or place.

Yes, her testimony was heartbreaking and seemed

sincere. She plainly has suffered. Kavanaugh, too, has suffered immensely. Nearly losing control throughout his emotional statement, he was as credible as his accuser. Riveted by the proceedings, I felt at times I should look away rather than play voyeur to the humiliation of two fine people — stripped of dignity and emotionally exposed before the world.

While many were horrified by Graham’s anger, I found it as cleansing and refreshing as a dip in the River Jordan. His points, meanwhile, were compelling.

Point 1: Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., sat on Ford’s July letter alleging the sexual assault until the eve of a scheduled committee vote on Kavanaugh. If she hadn’t, there would have been ample time to investigate the claim and conduct interviews, which Grassley did as soon as he knew of the letter in late September.

Point 2: If not for a leak that was likely from the Democratic side, Ford’s anonymity, which she deeply wanted, could have been preserved. But this wouldn’t have served the Democrats’ seeming strat-

egy of delay or their apparent hope for an emotion-packed display.

Kavanaugh’s suffering was epic. By all accounts, he has lived his adult life as a model citizen, an exemplary husband and father, a beloved teacher and coach and an admired judge. Yet, our esteemed senators found it necessary to parse inscriptions in his high school year book. Read yours lately?

With apologies for any nicknames that may ensue, Graham is a necessary voice, the human truth-o-meter and translator who shouts the truth from the rooftops, then ambles amiably over to the cameras, smiles and jokes with the very people he savaged, and tries to find his ol’ buddy Flake, who, Graham said, “wrestled” with how to vote, and maybe give him a little hug on his way back to obscurity.

Long may Sen. Cricket’s flag wave.

Still no charges filed in deadly prison riot

It’s been more than five months since seven inmates were killed and 22 were injured in rioting at Lee prison, but no charges have been filed, and there’s not even an agreement on who will prosecute the cases. That’s unacceptable.

State Law Enforcement Division investigators should have had enough time to identify and charge at least some of the attackers. The S.C. Attorney General’s Office also should step up to prosecute the cases directly or supply 3rd Circuit Solicitor Chip Finney with any help he needs.

But authorities apparently still don’t have a game plan for prosecuting those responsible for the carnage during the nation’s deadliest prison riot in 25 years. As reported Sept. 7 by *The Post and Courier*’s Gregory Yee, Mr. Finney said his office didn’t have the resources to handle such a complex case involving multiple defendants. He said his office was working with SLED, the Department of Corrections and the Attorney General’s Office on how to proceed. But that was nearly a month ago.

Robert Kittle of the Attorney General’s Office said his office was waiting for SLED and the Department of Corrections to wrap up separate investigations before filing charges or presenting them to a grand jury. SLED is handling the criminal investigation while the DOC looks at the root causes of the violence. And while the agencies sort all this out, the killers go unpunished.

It’s important to find out why the melee happened and how such events can be avoided in the future. But prosecutors shouldn’t have to wait on the results of the DOC investigation led by former Texas prisons director Brad Livingston. It’s unclear how far along SLED is with its investigation or what it might need to move things along.

While it would be tidy to prosecute all the cases in one fell swoop, SLED investigators should proceed with individual cases as soon as they have enough evidence to do so. The men who were killed and their families should be accorded the same level of justice as any victim.

Perhaps some of the suspects are among the 48 problem inmates moved to a private prison in Mississippi after the April 15 riot. If that is a factor impeding the SLED investigation, surely the DOC can find a place to house



them more convenient to investigators.

Compiling evidence against multiple murder suspects is no doubt time consuming, but investigators should already have some pretty strong evidence in the form of video surveillance from inside the prison.

Only one of the inmates killed — Damonte Rivera, 24, who was convicted of a 2012 murder in Georgetown — was ineligible for parole. The six others had their eventual shot at freedom dashed during a riot that took about seven hours to bring under control.

The state owes these men justice. SLED Chief Mark Keel and Attorney General Alan Wilson need to assure the public and the families of those killed that the culprits will be prosecuted soon. In the meantime, prisons chief Bryan Stirling has plenty of hard work to do to make South Carolina prisons safer and more humane.

S.C. should offer more safe, non-car options for travel

Building functional, effective and safe transportation infrastructure in South Carolina with its rapidly growing population and diverse

rural and urban environments is a challenge.

So rather than taking risks with untested ideas, the state Department of Transportation generally relies on widely accepted best practices. That’s reasonable enough, except that the notion of “best practices” can be awfully subjective.

What’s best for cars traveling at high speeds is usually not what’s best for pedestrians, for example.

DOT looks at a variety of sources to come up with its Design Manual, a nearly 800-page collection of charts, definitions, formulas and blueprints that shape the way South Carolina builds and maintains its transportation infrastructure.

For those of us who aren’t traffic engineers, it’s all a bit impenetrable. But considering that about 70 percent of South Carolina roads are state-owned, few other documents matter as much in determining how residents move around.

There’s plenty of room for improvement.

South Carolina routinely ranks among the deadliest states for overall traffic fatalities. In 2016, only Alabama and Mississippi were more dangerous per capita, according to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.

South Carolina also ranked No. 3 for the most pedestrian deaths per capita in 2016, according to the National Transportation Safety Board. It was the second-deadliest state for bicyclists that year. And the overwhelming majority of those fatalities

occurred on state-owned roads.

But earlier this month, DOT officials announced that they would start incorporating a new set of guidelines by the National Association of City Transportation Officials into their design standards. NACTO puts a premium on “places for people” rather than just cars, and the suggestions in its Urban Street Design Guide could drive a significant shift in the way the state DOT thinks.

Similarly, the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials guidelines — which form the basis for a lot of what the DOT does — were recently updated to offer more options for protected bike lanes, pedestrian crossings and other non-car infrastructure.

Both changes represent a welcome change of direction for organizations that have been rightly criticized as slow to adapt to shifts in transportation needs and preferences.

That’s good news for South Carolina residents who get around town on two feet or two wheels, even if just on occasion. And safer infrastructure could and should encourage more people to leave their cars behind for short trips.

Better guidelines ought to help cut down on car fatalities as well.

South Carolina should offer residents lots of safe transportation options. Smarter design guidelines are a big step on the right path. Now DOT just has to turn good ideas into good infrastructure.

More households winnow trash down to almost nil

Less may be more, but zero is the best of all — at least where contributing to landfills is concerned.

A small but growing number of households are joining what has become a bona fide movement: Zero Waste. While their goal of producing no trash at all may remain elusive, some Zero Wasters do come close, winnowing their household waste down to a tiny collection of non-recyclable and non-compostable items, so little that a year's trash can fit into a shoebox or a Mason jar.

Zero Wasters help each other by sharing advice on blogs and in books, over a dozen of which have recently come out on the topic. Tips might include where to shop to avoid unwanted packaging, and where to recycle a wide range of items that most people just toss in the waste bin.

"It may be too extreme for a lot of people, but even if you can cut your trash down by even 20 percent, you'll gain 80 percent of the benefits, like saving time and money for experiences instead of shopping for unnecessary stuff that will just clog up landfills," says Bea Johnson, author of "Zero Waste Home: The Ultimate Guide to Simplifying Your Life by Reducing Your Waste."

"It's about a simpler life based on being, not having," she says.

Johnson says that minimizing shopping has meant her family can afford to go on adventures like scuba diving trips; that makes it easier for her sons to accept wearing only used clothing. Buying only used clothes has contributed to cutting their household budget by 40 percent, she says.

"We can get most brands on eBay and request that they be sent to us without any non-recyclable packaging. And often the clothes and shoes are almost like new," says Johnson, who started writing about her zero-waste efforts in 2008, when the movement was still young.

Elizabeth Graves, editor-in-chief of Martha Stewart Living magazine, says Zero Waste is "definitely" a movement at this point.

"We have found that millennials in particular are incredibly mindful about how they live, and living with purpose. And that's why Zero Waste is really speaking to so many people," Graves says. "More and more people are showing that while it's intimidating at first, it can be done."

The magazine's Change the Day series recently focused on "Zero Waster" Lauren Singer of Brooklyn. Inspired by Johnson, Singer started her own blog, Trash is for Tossers, with tips on how to reduce waste, and even an online store, Package Free Shop, featuring only sustainable products that need not end up in the trash and that can be delivered with minimal — and fully recy-

ble — packaging.

Many businesses have begun trying to reduce packaging and making it more eco-friendly.

"I won't sell anything that has packaging tape or plastic," Singer says.

She claims she's now able to fit six years of trash into a single Mason jar.

"I realized that I can make a huge difference even as one individual," she says. "It's empowering."

The mantra of Zero Wasters is Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Recycle and Rot, adding a couple more "r's" onto the classic three. They refuse disposable containers and straws at restaurants and have made an art form of approaching store managers and others to request that food be wrapped in paper or put in glass containers they've brought from home.

Amy Korst, author of "The Zero Waste Lifestyle: Live Well by Throwing Away Less,"

notes that once food is buried under plastics and other items in a landfill, it no longer composts as it normally would. That's why it's so important, she says, to dispose of food and other compostable waste separately from the rest of the trash.

Each community recycles items differently, so the first step is to check with your local sanitation department to learn what, exactly, can be recycled and how.

"You might be surprised at the things that can be recycled," Korst says.

There are also a growing number of online resources to help figure out where unwanted objects can go.

Korst's book features many easy ways to begin reducing your trash, like cutting down on single-use items, particularly those made of plastic. It lists resources for finding non-landfill homes for things as diverse as cooking oil, batteries, ink cartridges, formal dresses, gift cards and six-pack rings from soda cans.

"We're not crazy hippies. We're normal families with houses and kids and cars, and this is the way of the future," says Johnson.


Lawyer: Charged clients had no idea marijuana was inside package

MYRTLE BEACH (AP) — A defense lawyer says two people who have been arrested are victims because they had no idea a package delivered to their home in South Carolina had more than 2,000 grams of marijuana inside.

Defense Attorney J. Stephen Grooms tells *The Sun News* that 49-year-old William Boeving and 45-year-old Marion Barnhill were arrested by Myrtle Beach police on Tuesday and charged with possession with intent to distribute marijuana.

Grooms says the package with more than 2,300 grams of pot arrived on Tuesday. He says Boeving closed the package and marked it return to sender after seeing what was inside. The package was not addressed to anyone at the home.

Grooms says he thinks Boeving and Barnhill will be cleared of the charges.



Metal cable strung across trail in Indianapolis may have been trap

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Officials say a metal cable found strung about neck-height across a trail in Indianapolis may have been put there as a booby trap.

TV station WRTV reports word of the cable

was posted this week on an internet site and the station contacted the city's parks department, which removed it. The cable was found on a small trail off Pleasant Run Trail on the city's east side that's used

by runners and bike riders.

Indy Parks spokeswoman Ronnetta Spalding says the department wants to "make sure safety is our top priority along the trails and in our parks."

Ants colonize family car in 3 days at Charlotte airport

CHARLOTTE (AP) — A North Carolina family returned from a three-day trip to find their car parked at the airport had been possessed by a colony of ants.

The Charlotte Observer reports Caroline Tedder Hacker lodged a complaint on Facebook on Sunday, warning people not to park in a certain section of Charlotte Douglas International Airport's parking lot.

She said the car's interior and engine were infested with ants, and her 11-month-old daughter had ants crawling on her during their ride back to Greensboro. She said the colony had been inside long enough to

build a nest in the corner of the engine.

Airport officials told the newspaper they offered to pay the cost of cleaning, in addition to waiving parking costs. They said ants tend to surface around this time of year.



Caterpillar Inc. to open plant in Greenwood next year with 85 jobs

GREENWOOD (AP) — Caterpillar Inc. will open a plant in South Carolina early next year that will create 85 new jobs.

State officials said Thursday that Caterpillar is spending more than \$13 million for the plant in the Greenwood County town of Hodges that will make casings used in en-

gines and transmissions.

The company said it would start hiring for the new jobs immediately.

Greenwood County Council has approved property tax breaks for the next 20 years for the new plant.

Caterpillar has two plants in Sumter.



Gamecocks struggling with up-tempo attack

COLUMBIA — South Carolina’s offense was supposed to be a highly efficient, quick moving machine this season.

Instead, the Gamecocks’ attack has been sluggish in South Carolina’s two biggest Southeastern Conference games so far. Everyone agrees the Gamecocks need to quickly find their offensive rhythm to turn the season around.

“We just have to make the plays that come to us,” Gamecocks receiver Deebo Samuel said Tuesday.

The Gamecocks (2-2, 1-2 SEC) will try and crank things up against high-scoring Missouri (3-1, 0-1) on Saturday.

Under the direction of new offensive coordinator Bryan McClendon, South Carolina worked on improving its offensive tempo, quicker reads and featuring a more varied offense. All the pieces seemed in place with junior quarterback Jake Bentley behind center and a host of returning playmakers in receivers Samuel and Bryan Edwards and healthy tailback Rico Dowdle.

But the Gamecocks have come up short in critical showdown games with No. 2

Georgia (41-17) on Sept. 8 and No. 13 Kentucky (24-10) last weekend.

Against the Wildcats, South Carolina fell behind 24-3 in the opening half and Bentley had just three yards passing the first 30 minutes. There were at least six dropped passes, including three combined by the typically reliable Samuel and Edwards.

South Carolina’s offensive SEC numbers show improvement — it ranks third in passing and sixth in rushing — yet its results tell a different story.

Red Sox, Yankees ready to rumble again in playoffs

NEW YORK — Fans have been waiting for another one of these rumbles: baseball's most-bitter rivals set to tangle again, this time as 100-win heavyweights in the playoffs.

Munson vs. Fisk, Pedro vs. Popeye, A-Rod vs. Varitek and earlier this year Brock Holt vs. Tyler Austin.

The Boston Red Sox and New York Yankees back at each other in the postseason for the first time in 14 years.

"We're a team that can play with anybody, and we're not afraid to go in there," Yankees center fielder Aaron Hicks said after a 7-2 wild-card win over Oakland sent New York to a best-of-five AL Division Series that starts Friday in Fenway Park.

Yankees fans were chanting "We want Boston!" during the late innings. The Red Sox tweeted "We want New York" after the final out in the Bronx.

"I think they're ready and relish the opportunity to go up against the game's best this year," Yankees rookie manager Aaron Boone said of

his players.

That is the same Aaron Boone whose 11th-inning homer in Game 7 of the 2003 AL Championship Series beat the Red Sox. A year later Boston overcame the Yankees and became the first major league team to bounce back from a 3-0 postseason deficit. The Red Sox went on to win their first World Series since 1918, but Boone's drive off Tim Wakefield has not been forgotten or forgiven.

Boston was 10-9 against the Yankees this year and set a club record with 108 wins under new manager Alex Cora, boosted by MVP candidate Mookie Betts, slugger J.D. Martinez and ace Chris Sale. New York finished eight games back and became the first team since the 2001 Athletics to reach triple digits in wins and fail to finish first — New York also set the major league mark for home runs, powered by the likes of Aaron

Judge and Giancarlo Stanton. These teams also have a history of hitting each other.

Back on April 11, Austin charged the mound at Fenway after Red Sox reliever Joe Kelly threw at him twice, hitting Austin in the side with the second pitch. Boston players were livid Austin slid spikes-first into shortstop Brock Holt earlier in the game. A bench-clearing brawl led to suspensions and fines, but Austin won't be around for a rematch — he was dealt to Minnesota in July.

"It's Yankees-Red Sox. That's what everybody wants. That's what they got," Red Sox star pitcher David Price said then.

Just another in a long history of bad blood between rivals a little more than 200 miles apart.

Boston player-manager Joe Cronin and New York outfielder Jake Powell fought on the field and beneath the Yankee Stadium stands in 1938, and Jimmy Piersall of the Red Sox and Billy Martin of the Yankees brawled beneath Fenway Park's stands in 1952.

A fight broke out in 1967 at Yankee Stadium after New

York's Thad Tillotson hit Joe Foy with a pitch and Boston's Jim Lonborg hit Tillotson — who after the scrap hit Dick Howser with a pitch.

In 1973, Thurman Munson crashed into catcher Carlton Fisk at Fenway after Gene Michael missed a bunt, and the All-Stars fought. Then at Yankee Stadium in 1976, New York's Lou Piniella charged into Fisk at the plate, and Boston pitcher Bill Lee was body-slammed during the fighting and wound up with a broken collarbone.

A notorious brawl took place during Game 3 of the 2003 AL Championship series, when Red Sox ace Pedro Martinez threw 72-year-old Don Zimmer to the ground.

Zimmer, a former Boston manager and then a Yankees coach, ran across the infield and lunged at Martinez during the fighting.

Then the following July, Boston's Bronson Arroyo hit New York's Alex Rodriguez with a pitch, A-Rod stared at the pitch as he walked toward first, catcher Jason Varitek got between them and pushed the AL MVP, leading to dug-outs and bullpens emptying.

“Our kids played extremely hard,” he said. “Effort has never been a problem. “If you line up right and play hard that’s one thing, but if you line up wrong and play hard, that’s another. We just have to pay attention to details.

Briggs said it goes back to practice during the week.

“We just need to learn how to pay attention to details,” he said. “Details matter in big games, and I think if we did that, we wouldn’t have left all those points on the field. At the end of the day, we’ve got to learn how to play in big games. That’s it. We’ve got to learn how to play at a high pace in big games.”

Briggs said aside from a few injuries and illnesses, this week’s practice has been pretty good. He said Cardinal Newman, 4-1 overall, is an up-and-coming program that will present a big challenge to his team.

“They’re one of the biggest teams we’ll play, and they have a tremendous athletic facility with a beautiful stadium,” Briggs said. “They’re a program on the rise and they’ve got a great coaching staff, so it’s going to be a big challenge going over there and coming back with a victory.

“We’ve got to do a better job in the red zone, finishing drives and coming away with points. When you consistently don’t come away with points, be it missed field goals or dropped touchdown passes or whatever, you’re not really able to get momentum, and that was a big part of the game last week.”

Missouri is coming off a bye week. In their last game, the Tigers fell to No. 2 Georgia 43-29.

Tigers coach Barry Odom said his players worked hard during the off week and are anxious to return to action at South Carolina.

He said if the Tigers stay focused and prepare the right way "then we can be a pretty good team."

Muschamp is seeking the same thing by paring the game to its basics. "Let's do simple better," he said. "That's where we are."

Fire department recognizes graduates, promotes members

MANNING — More than 100 family members, peers and friends attended the Clarendon County Fire Department's Oct. 2 Recruit Graduation and Promotion Ceremony that was held at the department's Station 1 Headquarters.

Showing his support of the county fire department, Third Circuit Court Judge Ferrell Cothran cooked his famous "chicken bog" for the event.

In her opening remarks, Clarendon County Fire Chief Frances Richbourg told the attendees that "it takes a special person" to be a firefighter.

"Remember that your training never stops," Richbourg told the recruits. "I encourage you to continue your education and participate in the skills, become proficient in your skills, and watch each other's backs. Understand that people's lives are in your hands when you respond to those calls."

Following a slide show that documented the recruits' training session, Capt. Jason Dennis moderated a roundtable discussion that featured five career firefighters that comprise more than 200 cumulative years of firefighting under their belts. Those participating in the question-and-answer session were Richbourg, former Clarendon County Fire Chief Carter Jones, newly appointed Assistant Fire Chief Jay Bruner, Deputy Fire Chief Michael Johnson and Capt. Ed Gamble and Dr. Robert Ridgeway III.

Jones, who has 52 years of firefighting experience, led off the roundtable session with a history of the Clarendon County Fire Department.

Jones said a need to provide fire protection in rural areas in the late 1970s led to the development of a countywide fire department. Jones said that while there was fire protection in the county's municipalities, the rural areas of the county were vulnerable.

Bruner was asked about what he considered his most "memorable" radio transmission.

The new assistant fire chief told of the time when he, along with two or three new firefighters, responded to a structure fire. With a smile, Bruner said he was a little nervous and the stress level was pretty much through the roof when he asked dispatch to send the power company to the site to shut off power to the structure.

While pulling the lines and trying to get things set up, Bruner said he grabbed the microphone and asked the dispatcher to notify the power company.

"I get back, '10-4 I need an address,'" Bruner added. "Well, I will tell you that I was not calm, and I will leave out some colorful language that I used on the radio that day I'm not so proud of, but I told them, 'Tell them that it's the only house on this road that's on fire.'"

Bruner said then-Chief Jones came on the radio and told them, "I think he's a little busy right now."

Ridgeway told the audience about his "most memorable" call. He said it occurred on Silver Road and involved fire ants, jumping out the back of the ambulance and the removal of clothing. But he assured the audience that by the time they arrived at the hospital he was properly attired.

Johnson gave the attendees some statistics on how important volunteers are to county fire departments.

Of the county's 163 firefighters, 127 are volunteers, Johnson said.

"It's huge," he added. "They make so much of an impact. It's amazing."

Johnson said Clarendon County has 37 career firefighters, 16 stations, 21 fire engines, three rescue units, six brush trucks, one ladder truck, two

boats and eight command units.

The recruits that graduated were Cole Ard, Zach Byrd, Matthew Cartledge, Raymond Davis, Amber Dorriety, Tori Hodge, Cody Justice, Thad Kennedy, Sabrina Tackett and Burns Yarborough. Kennedy was also recognized as the only graduate to attend each of the training sessions. Yarborough was honored as the recruit with the highest test score, and Tackett was the recipient of the session's Leadership Award.

During the promotion ceremony, Battalion Chief Jay Bruner was promoted to assistant fire chief. Travis Floyd, Jamie Nance and Mark Thompson were promoted to captain, and Blake Johnson and Brandon Welch were promoted to lieutenant.





Trying to prove it




