

S.C. education department is 'very concerned' about Mayewood

Official letter sent to district, board chairman after reopening decision

The state education department's leader wrote a letter to Sumter School District's leaders expressing concerns about the school board's vote Monday night to reopen Mayewood Middle School given the district's recent financial and other difficulties.

SPEARMAN South Carolina Superintendent of Education Molly Spearman brought up a handful of topics that are either ongoing or in the recovery process, mainly regarding costs associated with reopening and maintaining Mayewood and possibly F.J. DeLaine Elementary School next school year.

"We're very much aware of the issues going on in Sumter, and [we are] very concerned particularly with the financial instability the district has had," Ryan Brown, a spokesman for the state

education department, told *The Sumter Item* on Thursday.

education department, told *The Sumter Item* on Thursday.

After the official fiscal 2016 audit report revealed the district overspent its budget by \$6.2 million that year, draining its general fund balance to \$106,449, the state department put the district on a "fiscal watch" in 2017.

That same year, the state Legislature passed a law requiring all school districts to have at least one month's operating expenditures in their fund balance — roughly \$12 million for Sumter's public school system.

Agenda item: A request to rezone 46.99 acres at 2320 Beckwood Road from agricultural conservation to residential-15.

Background: The subject property has frontage on Beckwood and West Brewington roads, near the Sumter Airport, and is across from Beckwood Shires, another residential-15 subdivision.

Tyler Dunlap, a partner with the applicant, said the group also developed Beckwood Shires and intends to build more than 60 stick-built houses, starting at 1,800 square feet, on the subject site that will be comparable to the houses in the other subdivision.

Discussion: Councilwoman Vivian Fleming-McGhaney said she spoke with representatives of South Carolina Department of Transportation about resurfacing Beckwood Road and was told that project is "nowhere in sight for now."

But there will be consideration later, she said.

The condition of Beckwood Road was mentioned by a resident of the area during the public hearing for the rezoning request.

Fleming-McGhaney said other concerns, such as lighting along Beckwood Road, would also be addressed at the state level with local collaboration.

Mixed martial arts gym owner uses training to boost self-defense, fitness in kids, adults


ways been interested in martial arts, but by the time he started training full-time when he was 20, he felt like he had to make up for lost time.

He started training two people in his garage while he also managed the Food Lion in Sumter.

"The stresses that came with managing the Food Lion, I didn't get that stress when I was training people," he said.

When he found a space near Patriot Hall to rent, he took it and trained between five and 10 students. When a client offered Robinson a bigger space to operate out of his Cross Fit gym on Broad Street, he took it and started training 20-30 students.

1st female F-16 Viper Demo Team commander removed from position

An airman who was the first female to be certified as commander of the F-16 Viper Demonstration Team at Shaw Air Force Base has been removed from her position after two weeks.

Col. Derek O'Malley, commander of the 20th Fighter Wing at Shaw, announced in a Facebook post on Tuesday that Capt. Zoe "SiS" Kotnik had been relieved of her command position because he "lost confidence in her ability to lead the team." The F-16 VDT travels around the country to perform precision aerial maneuvers to demonstrate what the F-16 can do with a goal of inspiring the next generation of airmen and helping the public identify with the military.

"I know that loss of confidence is a common response from the Air Force whenever someone is removed from a command position, and I think it's important to understand why we take this approach," O'Malley wrote in the social media post. "We have thousands of airmen across our Air Force serving our country, and not one of them is perfect. As good people, like Capt. Kotnik, make mistakes, I want them to have the opportunity to learn from them without being under public scrutiny and to continue to be a part of this great service. They'll be better for the experience, and, in turn, we'll be better as an Air Force."

Kotnik is the Air Force's first female single-ship demonstration pilot. When she was certified for the command position on Jan. 29 by Air Combat Command commander Gen.

Mike Holmes, she had more than 1,000 flying hours in her eight years

of military service.

Originally assigned to the 55th Fighter Squadron at Shaw, she completed four certifications, off-station training flights and more than 30 practice missions, as previously reported.

Her historic appointment was promoted by the Viper team in a Tweet that depicted Kotnik in a superhero stance in timing with an advertising campaign for "Captain Marvel," a Marvel Studios movie whose protagonist is a female Air Force fighter pilot. "In these types of situations, I never forget that we're dealing with real human beings that I care deeply about and that we are charged to take care of," O'Malley wrote. "This will be a difficult time for Capt. Kotnik, but she's surrounded by wingmen that will help her every step of the way."

The commander said he was excited to have the first female demo team pilot "here at Shaw" but that he is "also just as excited about the many other females that are serving with great distinction across our Air Force."

"I'm proud to serve with them, and I'm inspired by them. Even as I speak, another female pilot from the 20th Fighter Wing is flying combat missions in the Middle East.

"Maj. John Waters, last season's team commander, has resumed that position, O'Malley said.

Waters was one of four pilots who comprised the United States Air Force Heritage Flight Program last year that performed the flyover for Super Bowl 52 in Minnesota. "The team is in great hands, and the show will go on," O'Malley wrote.

"We're looking forward to another amazing season with this team."

Alleged voyeur took photo, video of women

A Sumter man is facing more than a dozen counts of voyeurism after he was linked to multiple incidents where inappropriate images were taken of women in public.

Floyd Carlton Bryant, 39, is accused of coming into close proximity with the alleged victims and taking photos and video of women from beneath their clothing without their knowledge, Tonyia McGirt, Sumter Police Department public information officer, said.

The incidents reportedly happened

in multiple locations in the city including a Walmart store, T.J. Maxx and Prisma Health Tuomey Hospital, she said.

Since he was charged with two counts of voyeurism in August 2018 after a complaint, McGirt said, Bryant, of Crowndale Drive, was linked to numerous other reported incidents and alleged victims, many of whom have not been identified by police.

He was charged Wednesday with 18 counts of voyeurism and booked at Sumter-Lee Regional Detention Center where bond was denied.

According to a release from Scott's press office, the internship will provide students with the "ability to work with and learn from public service professionals." All internships are unpaid, but students will "learn invaluable work experience and skills throughout the internship that will help them gain a better understanding of how their government works."

In the North Charleston, Columbia and Greenville offices, interns will take an active role in the community by working on state-based projects of importance, answering phones, completing

research and other projects and being an integral part of day-to-day office operations. State office interns have the ability to assist with issues that are personally affecting South Carolinians.

In Washington, interns have the unique chance to research legislation, attend Congressional hearings and briefings, assist with press tasks and help with constituent letters on issues. Responsibilities also include answering phones, helping to coordinate meetings and other administrative tasks. By the end of the program, students will come away with a stronger understanding of the lawmaking process and will have improved their communication writing skills and critical thinking abilities.

Internship hours are flexible to accommodate students' course schedules but can generally run 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.






Background: This is a request for three budget amendments, which can only be approved through an ordinance and three readings before county council, county Administrator Gary Mixon said.

The first item is a request from Sumter County Sheriff's Office and Sumter School District to account for funds for after-duty

work that deputies perform at the sports complexes, he said.

This request, a new budget line item, he said, includes the addition of \$50,000 in revenue from the school district and an expenditure of the sheriff's office.

Mixon said the second request is to purchase two used fire trucks, at \$50,000 each, from the city to use in the county. Sumter Fire Department covers the city and county operations though tasks are separated between the two jurisdictions.

There is a good history of those two trucks, Mixon said, and they will definitely

improve the county's fleet.

The last item, he said, is a request to move forward with a contract proposal from the register of deeds office to have a company digitize old records.

Mixon said this would be a multiple-phase project, but this request focuses on phase one, for \$40,000, to help manage the system.

Discussion: Chairman Jim McCain said council was briefed of the requests during the fiscal, tax and property meeting before the regular meeting.

When he expanded into a space on Pike, he started at 1,200 square feet. In the six years he was there, he added another unit about every year and a half, adding kickboxing, fitness, boxing, a kids training unit.

The downside to that location was that they had to walk to a different unit for every one of those.

Now, on West Liberty, it's all one space for the 200 people he trains, which spans from kids to adults.

Starting a growing business has taught Robinson, a Sumter native, about business licenses, building permits, overhead and everything in between.

He said his time at Food Lion helped introduce him to customer service and managing other people. He has six or seven coaches who help him with classes, which includes training at the gym, in Hartsville and at Miss Libby's School of Dance and Gymnastics — footwork and cardio training helps the girls there with stamina for their dance routines.

His time working for the City of Sumter also helped him with being a business owner. He worked in zoning enforcement for six years and is in his 10th year working security for the city, both of which he said helped him learn about aggressive people and how to handle them. Working in zoning taught him about signage and permits and what you have to apply for through local government.

The business side is one thing,

but the true value for Robinson is in the physical, emotional and psychological impact on both the kids and adults he trains.

"I'd say 90 to 95 percent of the kids who come here are getting better grades, some of them have less behavioral issues, like they'll do their chores because if they don't they can't come to the gym," he said.

He said he has had parents tell him their son or daughter, after training for a while, no longer has to take medicine for behavioral problems.

Robinson said he tries to talk to his groups before and after class. If you open it up, he said, they'll ask anything. They want to know what kind of car he drives, what is his house like, does he have a girlfriend? (He married his wife, Crystal Robinson, two years ago this November.)

"With the adults, it's based on their goals," he said.

Whether he is helping an adult gain self confidence, lose weight or train for competitive boxing, or whether he is helping a child learn self-defense or a way to channel teenager aggression, he said he feels like that is the most rewarding part.

"I saw the effects bullying has and kids not wanting to go to school. I never wanted to be in that situation. And that was all face to face. Now it's all in texting and online," he said. "I always teach them never allow someone to take advantage of or touch you if you don't want them to. Go tell someone and always try that, but always be able to defend yourself and get out of the situation."

Senate OKs border deal; Trump expected to sign, also declare emergency

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate resoundingly approved a border security compromise Thursday that ignores most of President Donald Trump's demands for building a wall with Mexico but would prevent a new government shutdown. The White House said Trump would sign it but then declare a national emergency and perhaps invoke other executive powers to try to shift money to wall-building from elsewhere in the federal budget.

Congress' Democratic leaders, Speaker Nancy Pelosi in the House and Chuck Schumer in the Senate, quickly branded such a presidential declaration "a lawless act, a gross abuse of the power of the presidency and a desperate attempt to distract from the fact that President Trump broke his core promise to have Mexico pay for his wall."

House passage and Trump's signature were assured for the basic spending bill compromise, which for now would stamp a bipartisan coda on a nasty melee that's dominated the initial months of power sharing in Washington.

The specter of the national-emergency declaration has produced widespread opposition in Congress, but Trump is under pressure to soothe his conservative base and avoid looking

like he's surrendered in his wall battle with Congress.

At the White House, Press Secretary Sarah Sanders said Trump would sign the bill and take "other executive action," including a national emergency. She added, "The president is once again delivering on his promise to build the wall, protect the border and secure our great country."

Trump had demanded \$5.7 billion to start building more than 200 miles of wall. The bipartisan agreement provides under \$1.4 billion — enough for just 55 miles of new barriers and fencing.

An emergency declaration and other assertions of executive power to access money are expected to prompt lawsuits and potential votes in Congress aimed at blocking Trump from diverting money, which could conceivably reach billions of dollars. White House aides and congressional Republicans have suggested Trump might tap funds targeted for military construction, disaster relief and counterdrug efforts.

In a surprising development, Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell said he would support Trump's emergency declaration. That was a turnaround for the Kentucky Republican, who like Democrats and many Republicans has until now opposed such action.

CITY OF SUMTER BUSINESS LICENSES

The City of Sumter Ordinance regulating licenses for City businesses states that "Every person engaged or intending to engage in any calling, business, occupation or profession within the limits of the City of Sumter, South Carolina is required to pay an annual license fee and obtain a business license."

"The required license fee shall be paid for each business subject thereto according to the applicable rate classification on or before the 15th day of February each year."

A 5% PENALTY WILL BE ASSESSED ON ALL LICENSE FEES WHICH ARE NOT PAID BY THE 15TH OF FEBRUARY, AND AN ADDITIONAL 5% PENALTY WILL BE ASSESSED ON THE FIRST OF EACH MONTH THAT THE LICENSE FEE REMAINS UNPAID.

If any license fee shall remain unpaid for sixty (60) days after its due date, the Business License Department shall issue an execution which shall constitute a lien upon the property of the licensee for the tax, penalties and costs of collection."

two at-large board members who represent the entire county, was the superintendent at the time of the overspending. In the subsequent fallout, he retired in July 2017, and Debbie Hamm was hired as the interim leader on Aug. 1, 2017.

The state department put the district under "fiscal caution" on March 19, 2018, for "failure to maintain the mandatory minimum of one month of general fund operating expenditures in its general fund," Spearman wrote in her letter.

She also mentioned an investigation the State Law Enforcement Division opened in 2017 into the district's potential misuse of funds in the Child Early Reading Development and Education Program.

In connection with that investigation, Vivian "Libby" DuBose was indicted late last year on accusations of embezzling more than \$10,000 from the district while she was serving as its director of early childhood development and for unlawfully receiving more than \$10,000 in improper compensation for "training" that she did not conduct. If convicted, DuBose faces up to 30 years in prison. She has sued the district for \$5 million on defamation claims.

Under Hamm, the district was responsible for submitting a financial recovery plan to the state department to reach the fund balance goal with the new law. That initial plan — completed in her first month on the job and with a newly hired district chief

financial officer — included re-evaluating the entire budget, cutting expenses wherever necessary and making procedural changes in hiring teachers and staff.

Last year, the nine-member school board — albeit consisting of five different trustees before the November midterm election — voted to close Mayewood and Wedgefield's F.J. DeLaine Elementary School due to low enrollment and in an effort to save money, according to that board and the district.

Mayewood was merged this year into R.E. Davis Elementary School, which is less than two miles away in the eastern portion of the county, and became a K-8 magnet school. It was renamed R.E. Davis College Preparatory Academy.

As of June 30, 2018, the district's fund balance had risen to \$8.6 million.

"This plan distinctly contemplated the school continuing to remain closed, and there will be a clear cost to the district to reopen the school," Spearman wrote.

In this year's recovery plan update to the state department, Hamm said it includes \$2 million in savings — or recovery — this year from

budget line items reductions, which includes savings from the two school consolidations. In initial estimates from last month, district CFO Jennifer Miller forecasted the district to be at \$10.7 million by the end of this fiscal year on June 30, 2019.

The district must have one month's operating expenses in the bank by June 30, 2020, according to the new state law.

The post-election revamped board voted 6-3 Monday to reopen Mayewood next year. Before the vote, district administration members presented a cost analysis of reopening the middle school to the trustees. That presentation showed reopening Mayewood will cost the district in the range of \$1 million to \$1.2 million next school year and then about \$360,000 to \$471,000 in recurring annual expenditures every

year after that.

"The prior financial issues experienced by the district cause concern when consideration is given to the cost of reopening and maintaining two schools," Spearman wrote. "These unexpected costs may lead to the district having to declare a second financial deficit, which could result in a state of emergency being declared."

It is expected the board will discuss and vote on reopening F.J. DeLaine soon, likely at the board's next regular monthly meeting on March 11, based on trustees' comments in open session Monday. F.J. DeLaine students merged this year into Cherryvale Elementary, which is three miles away.

In the letter, addressed to Hamm, Miller and the school board's chairman, the Rev. Ralph Carty, Spearman requested the district submit a proposed financial plan "outlining the cost and impact of reopening the school" and an outstanding Individuals with Disabilities Education Act maintenance of effort issue by Wednesday.

"Beyond the financial concerns, however, is the impact on student achievement and consideration of educational opportunities offered to students," Spearman wrote. "Potentially diverting current dollars from the classroom to reopen two previously closed schools could not only have a detrimental fiscal impact on the district as a whole but most certainly post a risk for the opportunities currently offered students in other classrooms in the district."

In the discussions and process of the board voting to reopen Mayewood, Hamm has been adamantly against the idea. Carty was one of three board members who voted against the reopening.

"Like I said," said Brown, the state department's spokesman, "it's very concerning and seems to be a complete switch from a year ago when the board and the district seemed to be going in the right direction."



Many Americans will benefit from focus on heart health knowledge

It could be said that a study is getting to the heart of the matter during February's Heart Month.

The national survey conducted by MDVIP, a national health care network with more than 950 primary care physicians, and Ipsos found that while seven out of 10 Americans acknowledge heart disease as the No. 1 killer of both men and women, people still worry more about cancer (62 percent) than they do a heart attack (55 percent).

Nearly two-thirds of Americans (62 percent) failed the "Heart Attack IQ" quiz,

proving a lack of knowledge about heart disease, the risk factors and prevention. Less than 1 percent of Americans got an A on the quiz, with 3 percent getting a B, 12 percent getting C and 23 percent scoring D.

"The health care community has made important strides in raising public awareness about heart disease, yet our research shows a significant gap in how much people understand about the disease and their own risk for a heart attack," said Dr.

Andrea Klemes, chief medical officer of MDVIP. "Considering that at least 80 percent of cardiac events are preventable,

primary care physicians are a first line of defense in helping prevent, and potentially reverse, the disease through more comprehensive risk assessment, better education and health coaching that together

lead to long-term lifestyle changes in patients."

The survey reveals many Americans are uncertain, if not ill-informed, about the risk factors for a heart attack and what increases a person's odds for having one.

S.C. can now afford to put priority on public transportation options

The federal Highway Trust Fund is going broke. The trust fund, which is the main source of federal money for highways and public transportation nationwide, has been operating in the red for over a decade now.

That's a problem for states like South Carolina that depend heavily on federal

funding to shore up their transportation budgets — about 42 percent of South Carolina's Department of Transportation funds come from the federal government — and plan for long-term projects.

According to a report released last month by the Congressional Budget Office, the Highway Trust Fund spent an incredible \$115 billion more than it took in between 2008 and 2018.

Congress has periodically patched things up with infusions of cash. But the fund will be completely broke again by 2022 based on CBO projections.

The problem is that the trust fund gets most of its money from the federal gas tax, which hasn't been raised since 1993. That revenue isn't worth nearly as much as it once was by simple virtue of inflation, and vehicle fuel efficiency has dramatically improved on average over the past few decades as well.

Raising the federal gas tax by at least a few cents ought to be up for consideration, although that's not likely a long-term fix. Lawmakers should also push to make sure existing roads are brought up to safe standards before building anything new.

And mass transit funding should be a much higher priority given that so many communities nationwide are years or decades behind in providing alternatives to car dependency.

Right now, only about 1.5 percent of the South Carolina DOT budget goes to anything other than car-focused infrastructure. Nationally, the number is closer to 20 percent, based on data from the U.S. Census Bureau.

In other words, South Carolina spends only about \$37 million in state funds per year on buses and pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure, which isn't nearly enough to keep the state's existing bus systems running much less invest in something more transformative.

South Carolina, however, is relatively well positioned to handle uncertainty at the federal level. Lawmakers voted to raise the state gas tax by 12 cents per gallon in 2017, which will bring in about \$600 million per year in new funding once it's fully phased in.

The new gas tax money is supposed to pay for repairs and maintenance. That shouldn't change. But South Carolina could easily afford to put far greater priority on public transportation.

South Carolina could double or triple its investment in non-car transportation by shifting a modest amount of money away from new road projects, without unduly hampering the state's ability to build new highways.

And the federal government ought to shore up its Highway Trust Fund while demanding a stronger focus on mass transit.

Charleston and most other South Carolina communities are largely car-dependent in part because the vast majority of state and federal transportation money goes toward car infrastructure. For safer, more effective transportation options, we'll have to rearrange our priorities.

Top firefighters honored during banquet

Annual event recognizes members of Manning Fire Department for service

MANNING — Manning Fire Department honored its top firefighters at its annual awards banquet Feb. 11 at Manning First Baptist Church.

Three firefighters received top honors at this year's event where former Clarendon County Fire Chief Carter Jones was the guest speaker. Jones served as Clarendon County's fire chief for decades and has been credited with the structuring of the county's current fire department, which provides service throughout the county from numerous localized fire stations.

Alfred Breedin, who has served the department since 1973, received a service award honoring his 45 years of service to the residents of Manning.

"He has been an active and dedicated member of this department for 45 years," Manning Fire Chief Mitch McElveen told firefighters and guests before presenting Breedin with his award. "He is still an active volunteer, and he comes to all of our training and has won the Top Dog Award for the volunteer who responds to the most fire calls numerous times in the past and is also in the running for that award every year."

Another volunteer firefighter who is well known in the department, Larry Williamson, was presented with the department's annual Top Dog Award.

"This is not an award that is given, so to speak, but is earned," McElveen told those attending the banquet. "We ask a lot from our volunteers to come to monthly training, and most of the time it's actually two monthly trainings if they go to the city and county trainings. We know it can be expensive. It can be a challenge to our members to be able to respond when needed. This is a very important and outstanding achievement for the award winner."

McElveen called Williamson a dedicated volunteer and a good friend.

"I think this is the second time he has won this award," McElveen added. "There is no better person we like to see when there is a downed power line or during severe storms where power lines and power outages are occurring."

Firefighter K.J. Hall was the recipient of two prestigious awards, the Beyond the Call of Duty Award and the Firefighter of the Year award.

Hall has been a firefighter at the department since 2015. He started out as a part-time employee before being added to its ranks as a full-time employee in 2017.

Before presenting Hall with the Beyond the Call of Duty Award, McElveen talked about not only Hall's dedication to his job as a firefighter, but also his dedication to helping other firefighters deal with stressful issues.

"I established this award to recognize actions that our staff and volunteers may participate in that may or may not be related to just firefighting, but goes beyond what we do in our everyday duties," McElveen said.

McElveen talked about dedication when firefighters drop everything to respond to a fire on cold, rainy nights with temperatures dipping to 20 degrees or below.

"They don't do it for me or for the mayor or to win an award on Ladies' Night," the fire chief said. "They do it out of dedication to serve their neighbors and their community."

McElveen talked about the stress of firefighting.

"Many firefighters don't realize (the stress) until they go to bed at night and recall things that they've seen or situations that they have been in all day," he said. "We are not superheroes, and we have the same emotions and feelings as everyone else."

McElveen recalled an article that he read from a Florida TV station about the suicide rate of first responders. According to the article, 243 first responders committed suicide in 2017 — 21

more than the number of first responders that died in the line of duty.

"Here in South Carolina this problem has been recognized, and in 2012 the S.C. FAST Team was established," McElveen said. "FAST stands for First Responders Assistance and Support Team."

The mission of the team, according to McElveen, is to serve those who serve others by providing compassion by making connections inspiring courage, while changing the culture. The team's primary focus is to provide awareness level training to all of the state's first responders, to assist in recognizing daily stressors both in their personal lives and during their emergency responses as well as to respond after potentially traumatic events.

"This is a welcomed entity that we need," he said. "We have a firefighter who completely dedicates most of his spare time and days off and even takes off his annual leave days to assist this program. No doubt about it, he is dedicated to its purpose, and he shows it by the hours spent attending meetings and going to various departments with the FAST Team when they are called. There is no doubt that K.J. Hall has gone Beyond the Call of Duty for this year's award."

Hall also received the department's top honor, Firefighter of the Year, marking the first time a firefighter

has earned both awards within the same year.

"This is always my favorite part of our event simply because this award comes from our volunteers showing their appreciation to one of their own," McElveen said. To earn this award, McElveen said that Hall has not only excelled on the fire ground, but he's also at all the meetings and training.

"He's usually in his gear and usually working near the fire or rescue, and his fellow firefighters appreciate it," the fire chief added. "This award is one of the ways they show their appreciation."

New VA van will be dedicated in ceremony

MANNING — Giving to those in need is a cause that the folks in Clarendon County take seriously. They dig deep, and they don't ask for recognition, which is the true meaning of selflessness.

That generous selflessness was evident last year when in just eight weeks, the folks in Clarendon County contributed more than \$9,000 toward the purchase of a vehicle that would transport Clarendon County veterans to medical appointments at VA hospitals and clinics across South Carolina.

"It is beyond remarkable," said Leon Richburg, veteran and director of Clarendon County Veterans Affairs. "The citizens of Clarendon County came together and raised the money that was needed."

Fundraisers for the new vehicle were spearheaded by members of the Vietnam Veterans of America Chapter 960 with assistance from other veteran organizations in Clarendon County.

While hefty contributions

were made by various Sunday school classes at Manning First Baptist Church, Farmers Telephone Cooperative, Santee Electric Cooperative, the Sumter Elks Club and other businesses and organizations, the bulk of the money that went toward the county's portion of the vehicle's cost came from residents across the county. Volunteers standing outside Manning Walmart, Piggly Wiggly and IGA received donations ranging from \$20 to \$1 and for some a single quarter, donations made from the heart.

A disabled veteran drove up to a donation location outside Walmart and handed them a single quarter.

"He said that was all he had to contribute," the volunteer remembered. "He said he

wanted to give something."

The donations raised in two months amounted to more than \$14,500, which was enough money to pay for the county's portion of a 2019 Ford Flex, a carport to house the vehicle and money to assist in transportation efforts.

The new vehicle was quite a step up from the vehicle Veterans Affairs was using to transport veterans to medical appointments. The county's first vehicle was a donation transfer from another county that purchased a new vehicle and gave Clarendon County its old vehicle.

On average, Clarendon County volunteers transport 25 veterans to medical appointments on a monthly basis. In January, 35 veterans used the

service, and in February the total should reach 30.

"It's just about every day," said Dennis Kropf, a veteran, a volunteer driver and a member of the Vietnam Veterans of America Chapter 960, the organization that assisted in organizing the fundraisers, filling out the appropriate paperwork and raising enough money to fund the vehicle.

"It's a seven-passenger vehicle, and we've had it full a couple of times," Kropf added.

"There was definitely a need for the new vehicle."

The vehicle is used to transport veterans to VA hospitals and medical appointments that are set up by the VA, Kropf said.

"It's usually between the VA in Charleston and Dorn VA in Columbia," Kropf said. "We also have people who go to Sumter, Aiken and sometimes the Augusta VA."

While a volunteer driver doesn't need to be a veteran to drive the vehicle, volunteers must be 18 years old and go through the process which includes an extensive VA physical in order to become a volunteer driver, Kropf added.

"I also want to thank the volunteer drivers," Richburg added. "What they do for the county should not go unnoticed. They get no compensation for their services. Sometimes, they leave home as early as 5 a.m. so they can pick up veterans in Davis Station, Foreston, North Summerton, North Santee, Turbeville and other areas and get them to their appointments on time."

Richburg said that other volunteers who are not certified to drive the DAV vehicle donate their time and their personal vehicles to routinely take veterans to medical appointments.

"They are humble and don't want any recognition for all the things that they do," he added.

Richburg said several volunteers even dig into their own wallets to help with food, bills, renovations, repairs and other needs that the county's veterans are unable to pay for on their own.

"They do this as a service to those who have served our country," Richburg said. "The volunteers, the drivers and I are all on the same page. All I want to do is see that the work gets done."

Richburg credited his mother with his need to help others.

"Thirty years or so ago, my mother said something to me that has stuck with me over the years," he added. "The only reason God is blessing you is he wants you to bless someone else. I remember that to this day, and that's what I live by."

Clarendon County Veterans Affairs is hosting a Dedication Ceremony at 9:30 a.m. Feb. 18 at the Clarendon County Administration Building, 411 Sunset Drive, Manning, to unveil the new DAV vehicle. Representatives with the Vietnam Veterans of America Chapter 960, local American Legion Posts and the Department of Veterans Affairs will be assisting with the unveiling.



Legal thriller 'Proven Innocent' is formulaic to a fault

Fox launches the legal thriller series "Proven Innocent" (9 p.m., TV-14). As the title implies, it features a fierce defender of the wrongly convicted. For crusading lawyer Madeline Scott (Rachelle Lefevre), the subject is more than academic. She and her troubled brother, Levi (Riley Smith), spent 10 years in prison on for a wrongful conviction.

Educated in the slammer and since graduated from Yale Law School (because nobody on TV can graduate from a mere state school), Madeline joins the lawyer who freed her. The Scripture-spouting Ezekiel "Easy" Boudreau (Russell Hornsby) is her polar opposite, cool and calculating. Their team also includes the quirky, pop-culture-savvy assistant Bodie Quick (Vincent Kartheiser, "Mad Men").

Sometimes it's difficult to tell whether Madeline is out to clear her own name or take down the gruff prosecutor, Gore Bellows (Kelsey Grammer), who convicted her. And that's entirely intentional. The story basically includes a procedural or two of the week set against the backdrop of buried secrets from Madeline and Levi's teen years.

Unfortunately, "Proven" is formulaic to a fault and telegraphs most of its moves well in advance. If Madeline meets a mean blonde from high school, you can bet she's going to start looking like a suspect. If a client's exoneration requires finding a buried toxicology report, you know it's showing up in the next scene.

While it's always fun to see Grammer as the heavy, he's underused here and his character underwritten.

Premiering a show on a Friday night in February tells you everything you need to know about Fox's faith in

"Proven Innocent." Based on a comic book series of the same name created by Gerard Way and Gabriel Ba, "The Umbrella Academy" (TV-14) begins streaming on Netflix today. A tale of supernatural children with mysterious origins, "Umbrella" begins in 1989, when 43 women all over the world give birth at the same time despite the fact that they showed no signs of pregnancy. Adopted by the world's richest and most eccentric man, Sir Reginald Hargreaves (Colm Feore), seven of them are raised in his mansion, where their special skills are cultivated. Episode one begins in the present day, as they gather for Sir Reginald's funeral.

As fantasies go, this rounds up a lot of familiar tropes: foundling children of mysterious origins; special powers; a magical home for the gifted and a reluctant gathering of an enchanted alliance. NBC celebrates the King with 'Elvis All-Star Tribute'

A singer and a survivor, the subject of *"Olivia Newton-John: Hopelessly Devoted to You"* (8 p.m. Saturday, Lifetime, TV-14) has been in the public eye for more than 50 years. She's endured bouts with cancer and has championed medical research and established wellness centers.

How tough is she? She starred in the hilariously ill-conceived 1980 roller-disco musical *"Xanadu"* and still had a career. How bad was *"Xanadu"?* It didn't just receive a Golden Raspberry for worst picture; it inspired the creation of the Golden Raspberry Awards!

And that's not the only thing to climb from the wreckage that was *"Xanadu."*

Blessed with a near-alchemical knack for turning dross into gold, John's recording of *"Magic"* from the dreadful film's soundtrack became a pop smash.

Australian singer and coach on *"The Voice Australia,"* Delta Goodrem dutifully stands in for John. From the start, "Hopelessly" offers reverent re-enactments of the overly familiar, unfolding like a visit to a wax museum. John's performance with John Travolta in *"Grease"* has become iconic. So why try to re-create it, unless you're appealing to an audience that embraces these atrocities as camp?

The film ticks off the boxes of John's early resume, shows her agonizing over boyfriends, managers and mentors on her way to *"Have You Never Been Mellow"* and international stardom. We do get to meet her less-than-supportive father, who declares that he "always found her singing voice rather reedy." Sometimes the truth hurts.

Musical re-enactments and waxworks appear to be the order of a weekend that brings us the John biopic and the *"Elvis All-Star Tribute"* (9 p.m. Sunday, NBC). Blake Shelton (*"The Voice"*) hosts this tribute to the King, a commemoration of his iconic "comeback" special that aired on Dec. 3, 1968. Artists will reprise and interpret Elvis standards, from *"Hound Dog"* (*"Burning Love"*) to *"Love Me Tender"* (*"Keith Urban"*).

No. 1 Vols beat Gamecocks 85-73 for 19th straight win

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — South Carolina couldn't miss from 3-point range and still couldn't put up much of a challenge against No. 1 Tennessee.

Admiral Schofield had 21 points and 10 rebounds as the top-ranked Volunteers defeated South Carolina 85-73 on Wednesday for their school-record 19th consecutive victory. South Carolina (12-12, 7-4 SEC) made a season-high 14 3-point baskets and shot 60.9 percent from beyond the arc, but still trailed by double digits throughout the last 28½ minutes.

"It's a game at the end of the day, and they're going to make shots and we're going to make shots," Schofield said. "It's just we've got to eliminate as many opportunities for them to score as we can, and that's our job. That's what defense is, just trying to steal possessions away from them and create more for ourselves, especially on the offensive glass."

Tennessee (23-1) owns the longest active winning streak of any active Division I team and is 11-0 in Southeastern Conference competition for the first time in school history.

The Vols' high-powered offense assured that Tennessee would keep its winning streak going. Tennessee shot 9 of 20 from 3-point range and had five players score in double figures.

"We've got to get tougher," South Carolina coach Frank Martin said. "It hurts my soul that we're not a tougher team. That goes against everything I stand for, but those are the kids we've got. They're trying real hard. I'm real proud of them and we've got to keep working to get better there."

On a night when both teams were on fire from beyond the 3-point arc, Tennessee's superior accuracy from shorter range made the difference. Tennessee was 25 of 49, while South Carolina was just 12 of 40 on 2-pointers.

"That's all fine and dandy," South Carolina's Hassani Gravett said of the Gamecocks' 3-point accuracy, "but you've got to get stops. You can't keep trading buckets with a team like this."

Jordan Bowden scored 16 points for Tennessee. Kyle Alexander, Jordan Bone and Lamonte Turner added 10 points each. Grant Williams had eight points, nine rebounds and seven assists with only one turnover.

Tre Campbell had 19 points for South Carolina. Chris Silva provided 17 points and 15 rebounds, while Gravett added 15 points.

Tennessee took command by going on a 26-6 run that turned a 15-12 deficit into a 38-21 advantage. The score was tied 15-all when Jalen Johnson hit a 3-pointer while getting fouled to start a four-point play that put Tennessee ahead for good.

The Vols reeled off 14 straight points later in that 26-6 stretch. The 14-0 spurt featured two dunks by Alexander and 3-pointers from Bowden and Schofield.

BIG PICTURE

South Carolina: The Gamecocks haven't figured out a way to slow down Tennessee's offense. Tennessee shot 56.3 percent in a 92-70 victory at South Carolina on Jan. 29. In Wednesday's rematch, Tennessee shot 49.3 percent and dipped below the 50-percent mark only by missing eight of its last nine attempts.

Tennessee: The Vols are about to enter the toughest stretch of their schedule. Three of their next four games are away from home, including road dates with No. 5 Kentucky and No. 19 LSU each of the next two Saturdays. Tennessee hasn't faced a

ranked team since a Dec. 9 victory over No. 3 Gonzaga, which was ranked No. 1 at the time.

"There's a lot of basketball left to be played," Tennessee coach Rick Barnes said. "I know we've got Kentucky next, but I also know that we have to start out with what did we not do well tonight, and what do we have to do to try to fix that before we can even talk about Kentucky."

MISSING HINSON

South Carolina was playing its first game since losing reserve guard Evan Hinson, who also plays tight end on the Gamecocks' football team. Hinson had been averaging 9.5 minutes per game off the bench before leaving the basketball team this week to focus on football.

Tennessee welcomed back reserve swingman Yves Pons from a one-game absence after he injured his face while colliding with a teammate in practice last week. Pons wore a clear mask and played just three minutes.

FAMILIAR TRAITS

The Gamecocks said after the game this Tennessee team reminds them of their South Carolina squad that reached the Final Four two seasons ago.

"It's the discipline and the fight they have," Gravett said.

today at 8 p.m. against Hilton Head Prep at Sumter County Civic Center – that will be Reed's last game as head coach.

The school honored her on Monday in TSA's games against Northside Christian, in which the varsity girls didn't play because Northside doesn't have a team.

Reed had no idea the tribute was coming her way. Former players from all over the state, as well as from places like Colorado and Texas, were there honor her.

"I saw some of the people, and I thought they were just coming back to visit," Reed said. "It's just extremely humbling. I don't deserve all of this. I'm just a small cog in the process. Every player, every coach (who has been at Thomas Sumter) is part of this."

That being said, Reed has been the one making the calls for a TSA girls program that has been steady, and sometimes spectacular, during her tenure. Reed owns a 329-119 career record entering today's game. She led TSA to state titles in 2009 and 2017, and the Lady Generals played for two other titles.

She points back to coaches she had at Thomas Sumter when she started for instilling in her the drive that has helped her be successful as both a player and coach.

"Bobby Baker, Melvin McCormick, Tom Coper, Allen Watts, they all coached me," Reed said. "Each one of them taught me just not about basketball, but about life. I learned a lot more from them than just basketball."

Reed said they stressed a relationship with God first, followed by family, schoolwork and then basketball.

"They told me you couldn't be the competitor you wanted to be if you weren't competitive in every aspect," she said.

Reed calls TSA "my safe haven" because her players have helped her get through many difficult times in her life.

"When my sister (Marty) died (in a car accident), those girls don't know how much they helped me," Reed said. "It was like I had a piece of my little sister to coach."

"When my dad (Billy) died, the girls on that team don't know how they helped me. When my mom (Jo) had breast cancer, the girls on that team helped me. They've all helped me get through some very tough times in my life."

Reed said one of the great honors she had was getting the chance to coach both her sister and her daughter, Josie.

"Not many people can say they coached both their sister and their daughter," she said.

It did cause some family strife on occasion though.

"You know, in that situation it can go one of two ways," she said. "You

can be either too lenient or too hard. You can guess which one I was."

Reed, known for her intensity, said it caused some heated discussions with her parents and sister and then with her daughter and her husband, Jeff.

Reed, who is 47 years old, said her decision to step down came about when she didn't put the work in with her players over the summer that she has in past years.

"That's the least I've worked with one of my teams over the summer," she said. "It's not fair to them. They need someone who is going to put in the work with them."

She is planning on spending more time with Josie, who is playing softball at North Greenville University, and her son, Luke.

"Family took a back seat a lot of the time," she said. "Jeff has been an excellent supporter of me throughout the process."

Reed likes the way her team is playing heading into the state tournament.

"We're playing our best ball, but that should have come back in December," she said. "That's on me because I didn't prepare over the summer the way I should."

Reed is hoping she has four games left, ending with a state championship on Saturday, Feb. 23, at the civic center. Whenever the last game comes though, she will be at peace with it.

"My sadness (should TSA not win the state title) will be for the young ladies who worked so hard," she said. "I will not be sad for me. I've been blessed beyond measure."

ATLANTA — Braves closer Arodys Vizcaino has help for anyone confused by the team's long list of young starting pitchers, including several who had Atlanta auditions in 2018.

As Atlanta's pitchers and catchers prepare to report to spring training this week, there are many highly regarded candidates for at least one open spot in the rotation. The list includes Mike Soroka, Touki Toussaint, Kyle Wright, Kolby Allard, Max Fried, Bryse Wilson and Luiz Gosselin.

Vizcaino sees one starter

emerging from the crowd.

"Touki. Touki," Vizcaino said last month. "He's very good. He impressed me a lot."

Vizcaino wouldn't be swayed. Nor would he seek a diplomatic way out when asked about Soroka.

"I like Touki more," Vizcaino said.

And that was that.

Vizcaino isn't the only Braves player with high expectations for Toussaint, 22, who was acquired from Arizona in 2015. The Braves agreed to take on Bronson Arroyo's \$10 million contract with Toussaint for third baseman Phil Gosselin.

Toussaint could make that \$10 million price tag

look like a bargain. First, though, the 6-foot-3 right-hander with the big curveball must win a job.

Mike Foltynewicz, who was last season's breakout starter while landing an All-Star spot, is expected to lead a rotation that also includes Sean Newcomb, Kevin Gausman and Julio Teheran.

The competition for the fifth spot could be the highlight of the Braves' spring. The first workout for pitchers and catchers is Saturday. The full squad reports next week.

Jim France trying to lead NASCAR from the shadows

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — Jim France is running NASCAR the same way he lives his life — quietly, in the background, away from the spotlight he never craved.

The youngest son of NASCAR's founder carved his own path in the family business and left the leadership roles to his father, Bill France Sr., and then to his older brother. Jim France ran sports cars, served on NASCAR's boards and was content when nephew Brian France replaced Bill France Jr. as chairman of NASCAR in 2003.

Brian France made radical changes to the playoff system, approved a new car and stage racing, pulled NASCAR out of some of its traditional markets for big city exposure and, along the way, managed to alienate a chunk of the series' aging fan base. He showed little interest in calls for a condensed season, shorter events, weekday races and a greater variety of tracks even as NASCAR spent much of the last decade unable to stop a slide in attendance and television ratings or an exodus of top sponsors.

Then Brian France was arrested last August in New York, hundreds of miles from Chase Elliott's first Cup Series victory that same day, on charges of aggravated driving while intoxicated and criminal possession of a controlled substance. He immediately took a leave of absence and uncle Jim France stepped in as interim chairman and CEO.

Jim France has been at almost every NASCAR race since, available for drivers and teams and walking pit road, sometimes summoning officials to look things over. The "interim" label has been dropped from his title and it is clear Jim France is at long last running the show.

"I think Jim is doing a good job, just in being around," said 2015 champion Kyle Busch. "He's always got a pen and a notebook, he's in the trenches, he's asking questions and he's listening."

Still, he has offered no public insight

as to how he plans to end NASCAR's slump and has given no interviews during his six months at the helm.

France was highly visible last month during the Rolex 24 at Daytona sports car race. He was late to a news conference scheduled to promote IMSA's 50th anniversary season and took three pre-screened questions after a moderator warned he would not discuss NASCAR.

There was a brief moment in his remarks, while discussing Ben Kennedy's emergence in the family business, when Jim France seemed to be talking in broader terms.

"This is what we do, and we've got the next generation coming," he said. "We plan to keep it a family."

This comes a year after reports suggested the France family was looking to sell NASCAR, reports that have not been specifically addressed by the current leadership, including Lesa France Ken-

nedy, an executive vice president and the CEO of International Speedway Corp.

NASCAR late last year began acquiring the remaining public stock in ISC, which owns a majority of the NASCAR-sanctioned tracks. Layoffs began after the start of the year and many longtime employees, some who had started with the company under Bill France Jr., were let go.

NASCAR could, at minimum, be seeking investors. The silence has only fueled speculation.

"I think what Jim has probably done is he's sat back for a long, long time," said three-time NASCAR champion and current Fox Sports analyst Darrell Waltrip. "When he was put in the position that he's in, he knew that there needed to be sweeping changes. When the rumor went around that NASCAR could be for sale, there were probably a lot of questions about,

"Well, what am I buying?"

"I think what Jim is trying to do is trying to get everything under one umbrella where you can quantify, 'Am I buying the sanctioning body? Am I buying racetrack real estate? (Race) dates? What am I getting if I was to buy NASCAR?'"

The Daytona 500 on Sunday opens the new season and a new rules package will be introduced a week later at Atlanta Motor Speedway. The package is designed to slow the cars, keep them closer together and improve the competitiveness on the track.

There is a new car in development, NASCAR is actively courting additional manufacturers and series officials are taking a hard stance with drivers and teams to play by the rules. If a winning car fails post-race inspection it will now be disqualified and stripped of the victory. NASCAR also plans to fine drivers who skip their commitments to talk with reporters, another big change after years of drivers using the motorhome lot as a refuge.

NASCAR at last also seems open to altering its 38-race schedule that stretches nearly 11 months, adding more short tracks and road courses for fans who have begged for a fix to the stale climate.

It took Jim France taking over and then promoting Steve Phelps to president of NASCAR to get most of the initiatives rolling.

"Jim France wanted change and we will support him," said Hall of Fame team owner Roger Penske. "Phelps coming in, and he and Jim are making changes, they have looked at their overheads. I think they understand that the costs continue to escalate and we've got to turn it around and spend money that's rational."

"There's no question the show is too long. I think we've got to be looking at the schedule and maybe not run 38 weekends. That is almost too much, and I think they understand that and I think they understand there is a lot of work to be done in making this smoother."


